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## Plug your holes against hackers

I've read about burglars who break into people's homes, find nothing worth stealing and do a spot of housework to make a point. 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

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

## Create your own games with Giphy

The popular GIF search engine Giphy has launched a new platform called Arcade, which lets you play and share micro-games featuring retro-style graphics and stickers.


Many of the games are clones of classics, such as Breakout and Asteroids – you simply visit the website on your PC or mobile device, choose a title and drag or press on the screen to move the main characters. Each game takes mere seconds to play and is accompanied by music and sound effects that could have come straight from the 1980s.

What makes the service most intriguing, however, is the ability to remix the games and create titles from scratch by selecting one of 10



templates. You can choose your own characters from Giphy's searchable set of stickers, select a background and decide on some audio. When your game is complete, you can give it a title before having a play.

The entire creation process can take less than a minute to complete and the results can be shared with others. Players are then free to remix and share



your game, increasing the level of engagement. We expect more templates, games and options to appear as time goes on.

## Quickly save web pages to the Internet Archive



Users of the Internet Archive's Wayback Machine manually submit millions of web pages for archiving every day. This freezes a page in time and makes it available for subsequent viewing via the archive – an invaluable service for anyone looking for an earlier version of a website.

The archiving process has now been made easier – when you visit the Save Page Now section and enter a URL, just click Save Outlinks to capture the page and all linked pages and embedded resources, including the HTML, JavaScript and images, along with a screenshot of the archived pages.

Pages being archived for the first time are now flagged up and you can also archive pages via email, by sending them to [savepagenow@archive.org](mailto:savepagenow@archive.org). The

Wayback Machine is keen to encourage more archiving by introducing leaderboards for a more competitive edge.



## Explore stories using an image

A picture paints a thousand words and it seems Google Arts & Culture is taking this literally. To celebrate the 15th anniversary of Google Books, it is inviting you to flick through a virtual tome of facts and random images. By clicking a photo, the experiment will use machine learning – notably via the Google Cloud Vision API and Natural Language Processing – to connect the image to content from Google Books. It'll then give you some recommendations.

Selecting View More shows an even larger number of suggested reads, each of which is accompanied by a synopsis and a link to Google Books. When you click through, you can see where you can make a purchase. It's also possible to search for the book in libraries and see more work by the author.



## Convert photos into Teletext images



Sharp images work best and your work within the editors is saved as the URL you've landed at, to make it easy to share.



## Follow Champions League football

Although it kicked off after the start of the tournament, Google News' new Champions League hub should prove a winner with football fans. It lets you see the latest results, tables and imminent fixtures, and provides a wealth of media reports on matches and individual clubs, along with a selection of relevant tweets. The service works via the web, as well as in the Google News apps for iOS and Android (the app has an interactive



wheel that lets you view specific groups). To follow the action, type 'Champions League' into Google News and select the entry marked 'topic'.

## Put your pet's face on another animal


Ganimal is a quirky AI tool from Nvidia that uses a generative adversarial network (or GAN) to recreate your pet's expression and pose on other mammals - a tricky and impressive technological feat but, from a user perspective, as easy as uploading a photo of your pet and selecting Translate. The tool has been tested on Firefox and Chrome (we found it didn't work in Safari), and you can also read the academic paper and download the code from GitHub.



## See how green space affects property prices

According to the Office of National Statistics, living near public parks, gardens and playing fields increases the value of a property. To see the amount of money green space adds to the price of your home, enter your postcode and property price into this tool, then move the slider to see how much difference it would make if you lived further away.

### Move your music around

If you have more than one Google smart speaker, and have assigned a room to each device, you can choose where your music plays. Say "Hey Google, move the music to [room]".

### Delete Siri recordings

Upgrade to iOS 13.2 and you can delete your Siri history. In your iPhone's settings, Tap Siri & Search, Siri & Dictation History and select 'Delete Siri & Dictation history'.

# Need to Know

## Twitter bans political ads ahead of General Election

### What happened?

Twitter has confirmed that it will ban political advertising amid criticism of the impact of social networks on democracy, but Facebook doesn't look set to follow its rival's lead.

Twitter's plans were revealed in a series of tweets by co-founder and CEO Jack Dorsey, saying: "We believe political message reach should be earned, not bought". Part of the motivation, he said, was the company's efforts to address misleading messages and fake news in politics, which is made especially problematic if politicians and their followers can simply pay to spread a targeted message that says whatever they want. "It's not credible for us to say: we're working hard to stop people from gaming the system to spread misleading info, but if someone pays us to target and force people to see their political ad... well... they can say whatever they want." He ended that tweet with a winking emoji.

Twitter will not only ban candidates from taking out ads during an election, but all adverts relating to political issues, though it's not clear exactly what that means. Dorsey said the move was to avoid issue-led ads being used to circumvent the political ad ban because a politician or their supporters could buy ads promoting their stance on a partisan issue - Brexit in the UK or gun control in the US, for example. There will be a few exceptions, with Dorsey noting that ads in support of voter registration will be allowed.

The move immediately sparked questions about whether rival social

network Facebook would follow suit but, so far, the answer is a resounding 'no'. Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg said on a company conference call that the social network would continue to accept political advertising, despite the format only contributing 0.5% of the company's revenue.

Zuckerberg's argument is that political ads are useful tools for smaller, emerging parties and groups, giving challengers a voice against incumbents who already have a substantial base of followers. Whether or not that argument holds weight, it seems Facebook will continue to allow paid-for political ads for the UK general election on 12 December.

### How will it affect you?

The full details of Twitter's political ad ban will be unveiled in mid-November, with enforcement beginning on 22 November, which suggests parties and contenders in the UK's general election can advertise for the first few weeks on Twitter but will then have to halt that aspect of their campaign.

Of course, politicians and their supporters can still campaign on the site by relying on die-hard supporters sharing and retweeting their messages. But, after the 22nd, they will no longer be able to pay to target specific groups of people, so you shouldn't see any political ads from someone you don't follow. None of this will stop people

spreading propaganda and misinformation but at least they'll have to convince others to share it before anyone else sees it, which will hopefully limit and slow the spread.

There are, however, concerns about the impact of the ban on smaller parties and groups, who may struggle more to get their message out. Social media is an effective advertising tool that they've now lost. Dorsey argues that plenty of social movements have reached a "massive scale" without any advertising, but doesn't name any examples.

### What do we think?

This probably won't have a big impact on the general election, though we look forward to any research on the effect of this attempt to clean up social media for politics. Twitter feels very important when you're on it - and many journalists are - but with 16 million UK users (according to the London School of Economics), it's much less popular than Facebook, with its whopping 42 million UK users, which must surely cover most voters in this country.

Facebook has so far refused to block political ads, but Twitter's efforts may increase the pressure on it to do so, which we think would be good news for everyone. As Dorsey notes, social media has an impact on our democratic infrastructure and we should take the time to understand its effects.

## WhatsApp adds Android fingerprint unlocking

### What happened?


Tired of tapping a PIN into your phone to protect your WhatsApp chats? If your Android phone has a fingerprint scanner, you can now use it to keep nosy parkers from reading your private conversations, though this comes months after the same feature was introduced in the iOS version of the app.

The new feature means you use your smartphone's fingerprint scanner to open the app, even after unlocking your phone, which makes it impossible for someone else to pick up your handset and read your messages. So far, there are no plans to add

facial recognition for phones that support it.

### How will it affect you?

Fingerprint unlocking will work on all versions of Android with a scanner, provided WhatsApp has been updated to at least



version 2.19.222. To enable the feature, open WhatsApp and go to Settings, Account, Privacy. There, you'll see a 'Fingerprint lock' page, which lets you turn on the feature and set a length of time before the app automatically locks - immediately, after one minute or after half an hour.

If your phone starts to ring with a WhatsApp call, there's no need to fiddle with a fingerprint because you can answer calls without unlocking the app.

### What do we think?

It makes sense for apps to use advanced security features such as fingerprint recognition, not least because it makes them faster

to unlock and saves you having to memorise yet another PIN or password. But it's worth remembering that this only protects you from someone picking up your phone and reading your messages, not against hackers cracking the app and accessing your data, and it won't stop WhatsApp suffering security breaches and flaws. The new option is worth enabling, but you should also turn on two-factor authentication if you haven't already - for WhatsApp and other apps and accounts.

## Firefox blocks sideloading of extensions

### What happened?


Browser developer Mozilla is set to end support for sideloading extensions into Firefox to combat security threats from unofficial sources.

Most Firefox extensions are installed via the official Mozilla Add-ons repository ([addons.mozilla.org](https://addons.mozilla.org)) but you can also get them from other sources. Sometimes, the only way to get a certain add-on is to download it to a specific location on your PC, but this means the extension runs on all instances of Firefox on that computer, even on user profiles that haven't actually installed the tool. That's a problem if the extension contains malware or causes compatibility issues with

the browser, and means that other Firefox users on your computer may not be able to find and delete the extension.

### How will it affect you?

Firefox will stop support for sideloading extensions over two phases. In version 73, it will still accept sideloaded files but they'll be moved to the user's individual profile and installed as a regular add-on, so you won't lose any of your sideloaded add-ons. Version 73 is in beta release, as of the beginning of December, with the stable version following in February 2020. In the next version of the browser, scheduled for release in March, sideloading will be completely unsupported and users will get the ability to delete installed sideloaded



extensions more easily.

### What do we think?

This move will catch a few users out, but it's a better way to manage browser extensions going forward and follows a similar decision by Google last year to block add-ons from outside the Chrome Web Store. By

making the shift in two stages, no-one should lose an add-on they want to keep, but plenty of users will be able to get rid of those that were installed by someone else using their computer. It's a sensible solution to a small problem that has been causing a lot of headaches.

# Currys PC World customers scammed via eBay

## What happened?


Customers who purchased items from Currys PC World's eBay shop may have made an expensive mistake, after hundreds of payments were redirected by scammers on 19 and 20 October. Criminals were able to gain access to Currys PC World's eBay account where they changed payment information for certain listings to funnel the cash straight into their own PayPal account.

The scam is believed to have hit around 600 customers, and included listings for popular consumer items such as the new iPhone 11. Since the email address used by the fraudsters' fake PayPal account was similar to the official Currys PC World email address, few victims took any notice. That meant customers made their payments to the con artists rather than the retailer.

While we're all becoming used to the regular signs of an online scam - clues such as incorrect spelling and poor grammar - the fact that criminals were able to gain access to a real account would have made this case particularly difficult to spot and avoid.

## How will it affect you?

If you're one of the unlucky 600, then take comfort because your money should be returned to you soon. PayPal has been reversing the transactions, and advises that any customers who don't



see the money reappear in their account should raise a case through using the 'item not received' query.

For everyone else, there's still an important lesson to be learned: we need to be more vigilant than ever against online fraud. While it might be easy enough to ignore obviously fake accounts or phishing emails, scammers are getting more sophisticated by the day. Always double-check all payment details when transferring money, even if it's a routine transaction.

## What do we think?

Currys PC World and eBay have acted reasonably quickly in shutting down this

scam but it should never have occurred in the first place and there are serious questions that need to be answered. How did criminals get access to a national company's eBay account? How was the payment information changed without anyone noticing? It hints at a worrying lack of security, and it's critical that the tech retailer launches a thorough investigation to find out how this happened and how it can be avoided in the future.

This news also highlights one of the real benefits of shopping with PayPal: its consumer protections have made it relatively easy for anybody affected by scams to get their money back.



## FIRST LOOK

### Amazon Echo Buds

First Apple, then Microsoft and now it's Amazon's turn to jump on the earbud bandwagon. The launch of its Echo Buds has been somewhat overshadowed by the near-simultaneous release of Apple's new, upgraded AirPods. However, despite having its rich and bassy thunder stolen, Amazon's first foray into smart earbuds is largely a success.

The Echo Buds buck the all-white trend for earbuds and are only available in black. Amazon's Echo smart speakers have been praised for their excellent sound quality and this carries over to the Echo Buds. Audio quality is crisp and clear, and the buds employ Bose's noise-reduction technology, though it's



a far cry from the Apple AirPods' new noise-cancelling feature.

As you'd expect from Amazon, Alexa lives inside the buds. The smart assistant can be summoned with the wake word, thanks to the microphone buried within the shell. You can turn this off if you don't fancy having Alexa eavesdrop on you while you listen to podcasts, but be warned: switching off the microphone means you can't use the Echo Buds for calls. If you'd rather go Alexa-free, just ignore the terms and

conditions of the Alexa phone app and connect via Bluetooth instead. Despite the voice assistant's appeal, it's not essential to the Echo Bud experience.

While the design of the Echo Buds is sleek and comfortable, Amazon has made an odd choice with the charger, which is powered by MicroUSB rather than the newer, faster USB-C - and there's no wireless charging option, either. For serious tech-heads, that may make them a less attractive proposition but, for most everyday users, it's unlikely to be a deal-breaker. Playback lasts around five hours on an average charge.

Compared to the Apple's £249 price tag for its AirPods, Amazon's Echo Buds are a bargain at just £119, and we suspect they'll be further discounted for Black Friday.

# Are smart speakers still spying on you?

Hackers may still be able to eavesdrop on your conversations via smart speakers, rumours suggest.

Eavesdropping vectors and phishing scams, which get users to hand over private data, were first discovered in both Amazon Echo and Google Home devices in 2018.

You'd assume that by now the companies would have figured out how to prevent this from happening. Yet two researchers from hacking consultancy Security Research Labs assert that criminals are continuing to gain access to user data and conversations.

It seems that third-party apps could be to blame. Google and Amazon both offer back-ends to developers to create Home- and Alexa-based apps. When cybercriminals add the  symbol to the back-end, it forces the smart speaker to remain silent but active, as hackers listen in. Users are then asked for data, such as passwords, under the guise of checking your Google or Amazon credentials.

It's thought the issue lies with Amazon and Google's app-vetting services. While apps are checked for net nasties in the first instance, it's unclear whether subsequent updates - which may contain these malicious lines of code - are also scanned.

Neither Google nor Amazon has confirmed the rumour but they do state, more generally, that countermeasures are already in place and that no device will ever request your password.



### LIKELIHOOD RATING



**Google and Amazon's non-denials are suspicious and, thanks to 2018's litany of hacks, we know the spying is possible. It's such a simple hack, too, so we expect both companies to feel embarrassed. As well they should - this is our data, after all. However, we don't doubt they both take corrective steps each time a breach like this is found. But, for now, when you see the light on your smart speaker stay on, be aware that someone may be eavesdropping on you.**

## SECURITY ALERT! | What's been bothering us this fortnight

### Trojan malware found in 17 iOS apps

Apple has removed 17 malicious apps from its App Store and advised iPhone and iPad users to



uninstall them immediately. The apps were discovered by mobile security company Wandera, which found them to contain a form of Trojan called 'clickware'. This is designed to open web pages and click ads in the background without the user's knowledge.

The 17 apps span a variety of categories including video, fitness and travel, and were all developed by AppAspect Technologies Pvt. Ltd, a company based in India. They receive commands from a control server to surreptitiously load adverts,

open websites and even change device settings to subscribe users to expensive services.

"Clicker Trojan is a well understood class of malware that performs ad fraud by making frequent connections to ad networks or websites in order to artificially inflate visitor counts or to generate revenue on a pay-per-click basis," said Wandera.

### NordVPN hit by security breach

NordVPN has admitted that it was hacked in March 2018. The VPN service said that an expired internal private key - a tool that provides and secures machine identity - became exposed,



allowing the attacker to set up insecure NordVPN imitation servers.

By exploiting a remote management system, the hacker managed to gain access to one of NordVPN's servers, which had only been active for about a month. This server gave the hacker access to some of the encryption keys that secure NordVPN user data.

The company said that: "No user credentials have been intercepted. No other server on our network has been affected. The affected server does not exist anymore and the contract with the server provider has been terminated."

While the breach occurred more than a year ago, NordVPN only discovered it "a few months ago", and did not reveal its existence until recently due to security concerns. In the wake of the breach, NordVPN said it is "taking all the necessary means to enhance [its] security".

**Q** How worried should we be about the rise of 'stalkerware' ([bit.ly/stalker488](http://bit.ly/stalker488))?

**A** So-called stalkerware apps make it possible to intrude on your private life. By using them, an abuser can access their victim's

messages, photos, social media, geolocation and audio or camera recordings (in some cases, this can be done in real time).

Unlike legitimate parental-control tools, stalkerware apps run hidden in the background, without a victim's knowledge or consent. They are often promoted as software for spying on a partner and may need to be installed manually on the victim's phone, so the abuser needs physical access to the device.

At Kaspersky, we have in the last few months increased the ability of our products to detect stalkerware, and will continue

to do so as we support the fight against stalkers.

To avoid being monitored by stalkers, Kaspersky recommends:

- Blocking the installation of programs from unknown sources in your smartphone's settings
- Never disclosing the password or passcode to your mobile device, even to someone you trust
- Never storing unfamiliar files or applications on your device, as they could harm

your privacy

- Changing all security settings on your mobile device if you are leaving a relationship
- Checking the list of applications on the device to find out if suspicious programs were installed without your consent

Highlighting that women are just as capable as men of committing serious crimes, this interactive website from Europol uses innovative means to unveil the policing agency's most wanted suspects: click a picture of a masked fugitive and scroll to read about their crimes. By the end, each face is revealed, with 18 of the 20 suspected criminals being female (a 21st has already been arrested). Although the details provided lack depth, the stylish site hopes to encourage visitors to submit information via an online form. It also makes it easy to share the felons' profiles on social media as it seeks to engage the internet in EU-wide man- (and woman-) hunts.

## Old Maps Online

Browsing historical maps is not only educational but illuminating, too, if you have the time to skip between websites to explore different areas and time periods. Old Maps Online makes navigating the past much easier by providing a gateway to historical maps in libraries around the world. These are sourced from external sites such as the British Library and the David Rumsey Map Collection, and you can either click a map to browse it full-size or see it as an overlay on the current view. As you explore the globe, the search results in the sidebar update automatically to show you all available maps for the highlighted area. You can then click the Timeline button at the top of the page to filter the data by date range. It's fascinating stuff.



## Mapmerizer


“Think of London,” sang Talking Heads in 1979, “a small city”. But is it really smaller than New York, Bangkok or Rio de Janeiro? And is Birmingham, Alabama bigger than Birmingham, West Midlands? Find out by visiting Mapmerizer, which lets you compare Google maps of any two cities, towns or countries in the world side by side. You can zoom into and out of both locations simultaneously, view roads, transport routes and cycling lanes, and – best of all – switch to Satellite view to get an accurate picture of how they look from above. It's a brilliant way to discover the differences and similarities between places situated many miles apart.



## A People Map of the UK

Launched back in June, this ingenious map replaces the names of towns and cities across the UK with the names of the most famous people who were born there, lived there or have a strong connection with the place. Rather than make arbitrary decisions about notability, the map is based on the popularity of the residents' Wikipedia pages – the more traffic they receive, the larger their names appear. Some of the results are predictable, such as Shakespeare for Stratford-upon-Avon and The Beatles for Liverpool, but there are plenty of surprises, too (Carol Vorderman for Bedford). ## MarineTraffic

There are lots of great sites and apps for tracking planes in real time, of which FlightRadar24 ([www.flightradar24.com](http://www.flightradar24.com)) is undoubtedly the best, but if you want to know what's happening at sea, you should head to MarineTraffic. This site provides a live map of all the ships, boats and other vessels currently sailing around the waterways and seas of the world. The oceans are a lot busier than you'd imagine and MarineTraffic helpfully colour-codes craft by type, so you can identify, for example, fishing trawlers, cruise ships, tankers and cargo vessels. You can search the map data by vessel and port, and apply filters and layers, though advanced features require you to pay £11 a month for a subscription.



## Police.uk

Not all local crime gets reported in the press, but it is likely to have been logged by the police, which makes Police.uk an invaluable resource for concerned residents of England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Click the Find Your Neighbourhood button on the homepage, enter your postcode and click Search to see a map of recent incidents near your home. You can filter these by month and crime type – from anti-social behaviour and burglary through to shoplifting and violence; expand the selected area to a mile radius or draw it free-hand; and view detailed statistics about crime levels, case timelines and outcomes.



**Q** I write a blog about books and have been invited to take part in a 'blog tour'? Is it a scam?

**A** This is a marketing event, most often used by book publishers to spread the word about their books. They usually give information and review copies to various different blogs on different days, often over the course of a week, and agree with the blog owner what they will publish about the book and when. They then promote the tour to their fans, so you'll get an extra push of visitors to your site in exchange for featuring information about their book.

It's not a scam but it's probably more beneficial for the book publisher than it is for you, so make sure you're happy with the arrangement before agreeing to it.







## Netflix faces backlash over speed option

Netflix has enraged filmmakers by testing an option to speed up and slow down video playback, saying that viewers have been able to vary DVD speed for decades.

# Product Test

We test and compare the latest products

## Google Pixel 4

With an extra camera, new design and radar-sensing abilities, is Google's new flagship model now the best smartphone around?

The first thing you notice when you pull the Pixel 4 out of its box is its updated design. Google has ditched the two-tone look of its previous three generations and instead opted for a simpler single-tone colour scheme, available in black, white and orange. Whatever the colour, the phone is surrounded by a softly-curved textured black trim, with a coloured power button and volume rocker on the right edge. There's no notch on the screen, but the selfie camera and earpiece speaker are located inside a chunky top bezel.

Elsewhere, the Pixel 4 is sandwiched between protective layers of Gorilla Glass. The new rear camera module is square and distinctly iPhone-like, with the two cameras, infrared sensor and dual-LED flash arranged in a diamond.

It has dual front-facing speakers but there's still no 3.5mm headphone jack. Sadly, Google hasn't included an adapter in the box, either. There's no fingerprint sensor but you can unlock the Pixel 4 using your face or with a PIN or pattern lock.

The screen is 5.7in from corner to corner, with a new refresh rate of 90Hz. In technical testing, we measured peak screen brightness at 430cd/m<sup>2</sup> (candles per square metre) in automatic brightness mode, promising readability in most



sunny environments in the UK. The screen's sRGB coverage in the phone's 'Natural' colour mode is at 90.5%, which is very good.

Inside the Pixel 4, you'll find a Qualcomm Snapdragon 855 processor and 6GB of memory. Both the Pixel 4 and

4 XL come with either 64GB or 128GB of internal storage, but it's worth noting, you can't expand this via microSD.

Unsurprisingly, this hardware combo delivers barnstorming benchmark results and offers a slick, responsive experience all

around. In our Geekbench 4 test, the Pixel 4 performed better than its predecessor and matches the Galaxy S10's Exynos 9820 chipset in multi-core performance. It's a similar story for gaming and graphics performance, with the embedded Adreno 640 GPU delivering a higher framerate than the Galaxy S10 and iPhone 11 in the GFXBench on-screen Manhattan 3.0 test.

Unfortunately, the Pixel's battery lasted a mere 12 hours and 7 minutes in our standardised video rundown test. Looking at the numbers, that's slightly worse than the Pixel 3's result from last year, and is miles off the Galaxy S10 and iPhone 11. This is a phone that might just about make it through a day on a single charge, but you'll have to be very conservative with what you do with it. Most high-priced phones reach at least 20 hours under the same conditions.

### New features

Arguably the most intriguing new feature is the Pixel 4's system of gesture-based controls. It essentially uses a motion-sensing radar, powered by a small custom chip embedded into the handset itself, which detects motion around the phone. Previous phones claiming similar functions have used the front-mounted camera to detect movement, but this new radar chip lets you

interact with the phone from seemingly any angle.

This is most useful for unlocking the phone, with the screen lighting up whenever the Pixel 4 detects movement and swiftly turning off if it's left alone. You can also snooze alarms, skip songs on Spotify and cycle through your YouTube playlists with a waggle of your hand.

The Pixel 4 is running the latest version of Google's mobile operating system, Android 10, with its own Pixel launcher overlay. Android 10 is currently only available on a select few phones and includes a handful of new features and software tweaks.


A system-wide dark mode is (finally) an option, as well as a new 'focus mode', which hides notifications from apps you deem distracting. Swiping your thumb across from either side of the screen now acts as the Back button, swiping up from the bottom of the screen brings you to the home screen and swiping up while holding your finger in the middle of the screen opens a list of recent apps. It's the best version of Android yet and finally manages to give iOS 13 a proper run for its money in both responsiveness and general speed.

## Cameras

Google has included the same 12-megapixels camera unit from previous years, though it's now boosted by a new 16-megapixels 2x telephoto zoom camera. However, this isn't particularly special - it simply allows you to zoom further into the frame. Most phone makers have incorporated zoom lenses into their flagship phones for some time now.

The Pixel phones have always taken great photos, though, and that has been further improved here, particularly in the already excellent 'Night Sight' mode, with better colour balance in the dark.

Image quality is as effortlessly brilliant as ever - whatever the lighting conditions, you can rest

assured that your pictures will burst with intricate details, well-judged exposures and a pleasingly-accurate colour rendition.

Mercifully, Google refuses to adopt Apple's pricing mode of charging upwards of four figures for its latest flagship handsets, so the

64GB Pixel 4 can be picked up for £669, while the 128GB variant costs £769. This makes it one of the cheapest flagship smartphones on the market. Apple's iPhone 11 Pro starts at £1,049 and the Samsung Galaxy S10 launched at £799, though you can find it discounted now.

## OUR VERDICT



The Pixel 4 isn't perfect - fans will be disappointed by the lack of microSD support and fingerprint reader, while improvements to the camera come via the software rather than the hardware. Even more worryingly, battery life is disappointing for a phone of this price.

# Echo Dot with Clock

The new Echo Dot takes Amazon's winning formula for its smallest smart speaker and adds a clock. What's not to like?

One of the most common questions asked of the Amazon Echo is "What time is it?", but voicing this aloud is not always practical – if your device is in a shared bedroom, for example – and it's actually a lot quicker to just look at the time than have a conversation about it.

The new Echo Dot with Clock tackles this by displaying the time in bright LEDs across its side. The built-in clock can also show timers, display its volume level and indicate the temperature outdoors. That's essentially the only difference between this and last year's excellent Echo Dot.

## Clock functions

These extras add a tenner to the price, bumping up the base outlay for the Echo Dot with Clock to £60 (though it's



on offer at £44.99 as we write this review).

When switched off, the device looks exactly like last year's model, with the same chunky dimensions and a fabric covering that wraps around the sides. It's only when you plug it in that the new change becomes apparent.

Underneath the fabric cover is a segmented LED display capable of showing a digital clock and, when required, other information. It doesn't display advanced graphics or video like an Echo Show, but it works well and adapts its brightness to match its environment.

Amazon clearly has two rooms in mind for the Echo Dot with Clock: the kitchen and the bedroom. The former is handy for cooking, as the clock is replaced with a visual countdown when a timer is set. In the bedroom, setting an alarm places a small circle next to the time and neatly lets you silence an alarm with a tap on the top, like the snooze function on a standard alarm clock.

## Sound quality and Alexa

The speaker's sound quality is as good as last year's third-generation Dot and in line with what you'd expect from a £50 speaker. It also

retains the 3.5mm audio jack output, so you can connect it to a better speaker if you want to improve the audio.

Alexa, meanwhile, is identical, which is no surprise





This powerful image browser and editor, which replaces the discontinued Picture Window Pro 7, is a complete rewrite that's now entirely free for both personal and commercial use, although you are invited to make a donation to the author if you like the program enough.

Picture Window Pro's interface is a little unusual, but you'll soon get used to it. Some tools are laid out across the top of the screen, while others are accessible from the menu bar.

The image you're currently working on appears in the window on the right, with thumbnails of all open photos ranged down the left-hand side where you can easily switch between them. Each change you make to an image gets its own



thumbnail below the main one, so it's easy to see which action you've just performed


and jump back a stage or two with a click of your mouse. The software uses non-destructive editing, so you can undo any changes, even after you've saved the final image.



## CHROME

### Apply dark mode to every website

It seems that dark mode is available for virtually every app, but only a handful of websites offer this easy-on-the-eyes option, which means you need to install an extension to get dark mode on your favourite sites.

To remedy this, Google has finally unveiled a new experimental 'flag' that forces dark mode across the board - no more awkward workarounds or unnecessary tools clogging up the browser. To activate the feature, visit the Chrome Experiments page at <chrome://flags> and search for 'dark mode'. Here, you'll find the setting 'Force Dark Mode for Web Contents'. Use the drop-down menu to switch from Default to Enabled, then relaunch the browser.

To check that the forced dark mode is working, head over to Google - which you'll now be able to do at night without being blinded by the glare of its once-white background. You can turn it off again by choosing Disabled next to its entry on the Chrome Experiments page.



### Find out what's new in Chrome 78

The latest version of Chrome has been released. Typically, these big iterations bring major refinements to the browser but, while there are a handful of changes in Chrome 78, it lacks the blockbuster features of previous editions. Security fixes form the bulk of the changes - 37 have been patched, including several marked 'High priority' - but many promised extras, such as the useful password checker, have been bumped to the forthcoming Chrome 79.



The most eye-catching new feature is the tab overlay. In older versions of Chrome, hovering your cursor over a tab displayed the title of the web page. When you perform the same action in Chrome 78, this pop-up now includes the site's URL.

Your browser should automatically update to the new version, but you can force it to do so by clicking the three-dot menu, then pressing Help, About Chrome.

### Manage Chrome extensions more easily

If there's one complaint about Chrome extensions, it's that managing them isn't exactly efficient, which is where Chrome Extension Manager ([bit.ly/manager488](http://bit.ly/manager488)) comes in. This easy-to-use browser tool displays all your installed extensions in a neat list and gives you a lot more control compared to the fiddly default option offered by Chrome.

Along the top of the window, there is a search bar for accessing specific extensions without scrolling. Beneath this are your browser tools, arranged alphabetically. To the left of each one is a tick box that disables and enables the tool; to the right, a three-dot icon that lets you jump to the Chrome extension-management screen. Extensions can also be grouped together by clicking the cog and selecting 'New group'.



### Focus while you browse

Going online opens up a minefield of distractions, but there is a way to keep your focus without using extensions that block your access to sites and force you to do your work. Rather than the stick, Rofocus ([bit.ly/rofocus488](http://bit.ly/rofocus488)) offers the carrot. Designed to "increase focus and productivity", this browser tool plays ambient background sounds to help you concentrate.

Start by choosing an ambient sound - from the Amazon forest to a Parisian café - then hop across to the Focus Timer window. By default, the countdown timer is set to 25-minute intervals, but this can be changed. The idea is that, by coupling a predetermined 'focus time' with background sounds, your brain can de-stress, becoming more creative and focused.




# Remove trackers from any website

The web can be a dirty place – most sites are infested with cookies and you can barely move for JavaScript and third-party trackers lurking in web pages. Site Bleacher ([bit.ly/bleach488](http://bit.ly/bleach488)) simplifies the removal of cookies, locally stored data and other browsing junk that websites use to collect your data and spy on you.


Visit any site and a badge appears on the toolbar button, letting you know that something on the site can be removed. Click this and you're presented with three options. Beside the URL is the option to whitelist the site and, below that, a switch to whitelist only the current tab. This whitelist can be managed by clicking Settings. To clear your data from the site, just click Clean.



## Track prices and bag a bargain

With Black Friday fast approaching and Christmas hot on its heels, it's time to keep your eyes peeled for the hottest bargains. Thankfully, the Otsledit Price Tracker ([bit.ly/price488](http://bit.ly/price488)) frees you from sitting shackled to Amazon, refreshing the page and desperately waiting for price drops. The extension offers three options: Create Track, Track Price and Watchlist. Clicking Track Price is the easiest way to watch for incoming bargains. Create Track is a little more in-depth: click the button, select a specific area on the page – in this case, the item's price – and confirm that you wish to track the area. You'll now be notified if that section of the website changes.

You can view all currently tracked items in your Watchlist.



## Customise your new tabs

If you're looking to make your new tabs more exciting and enhance them with some practical tools, then install @Home ([bit.ly/home488](http://bit.ly/home488)). This add-on starts you off with a blank slate when you first open a new tab, but click the three-line button and you'll find a host of options to add.


Start by choosing the tile icon. This is the 'store' (don't worry, it's all free), where you can add various extras such as a clock, a search bar and quick links to your favourite sites. Drag and drop the modules into place, then open the three-line menu again and click the pencil icon to resize the boxes on the new tab.

Now click the cog to enter the settings for each element – you can write a greeting message, add URLs to your quick links and create background images or colours.


There are lots of Wiki channels – from the online encyclopaedia Wikipedia to the handy online manuals of WikiHow and the entertaining Wikiquote, where notable quotations are archived. Black Menu for Wikipedia ([bit.ly/wikipedia488](http://bit.ly/wikipedia488)) is an Opera add-on that lists all the different Wiki sites, including lesser known ones



such as travel guide Wikivoyage. Rather than acting as a bookmark tool for the Wiki empire, websites are displayed in a fly-out window where each site is fully navigable and doesn't need to be opened in a new tab.

### Hear websites read aloud

The new Edge browser includes the option to have web pages read aloud in Immersive Reader mode. Simply click the book icon in the address bar to reveal a toolbar that can be pinned by clicking the drawing-pin button. Here, you'll see two additional options: 'Read aloud' is a robotic narrator, with playback controls at the top of the screen, alongside a selection of voices; 'Text preference' is ideal for anyone struggling to read what's on the screen, and provides tools for increasing the font size and changing the background colour.

We admit that we're cheating a little with our App of the Fortnight this issue. In fact, it's actually five separate free apps - all from Google's experimental Creative Lab team - that are designed to improve your digital wellbeing in one way or another.

First up is Desert Island ([bit.ly/desert488](http://bit.ly/desert488)), a simple tool that helps you focus by game-ifying your phone use and challenging you to go for a full 24 hours with only a handful of your most essential apps.

Next up is Morph ([bit.ly/morph488](http://bit.ly/morph488)), which aims to provide you with the apps you need at the times you need them. You're tasked with thinking about how you use your time so your device can adapt to present you with the apps appropriate to a specific

time or location. For example, if you only exercise in the afternoon, your fitness-tracker app will be hidden at other times of the day. It's a good way to avoid unnecessary distractions.


Post Box ([bit.ly/post488](http://bit.ly/post488)) is a very useful tool that basically stockpiles all your notifications. You schedule how often and when you'd like them delivered, and remain blissfully uninterrupted by pings, dings and on-screen messages until that time arrives.

Unlock Clock ([bit.ly/unlock488](http://bit.ly/unlock488)) helps you consider how much you use your phone by displaying a running tally every time you unlock it.

Finally, We Flip ([bit.ly/weflip488](http://bit.ly/weflip488)) is another game-ified way to switch off from technology - this

## Our guide to Tile


If you often mislay your keys, wallet or phone, Tile tracking tags can locate them in a jiffy. **David Crookes** explains how they work

### What is Tile?

Tile ([www.thetileapp.com](http://www.thetileapp.com)) is a series of Bluetooth tracking devices that bring smart technology to everyday 'dumb' devices such as keys, wallets and bags. Available in various shapes and sizes, these tags allow you to pinpoint the location of lost items using a smartphone app or digital voice assistant. They can also be used to find your phone, making them a blessing for the more absent-minded among us.

### How do Tiles work?

As well as harnessing the location capabilities of a smartphone, the trackers use Bluetooth low-energy, otherwise known as Bluetooth LE. When you physically place a Tile on an item and activate it, it becomes discoverable, while using the lowest possible power consumption. Should you end up losing the item it's attached to, you can open the Tile's Android or iOS app (or ask Google, Alexa or Siri) and try to establish a connection. If the Tile tracker is in range, it will make a noise, so you can follow the sound to find the item.

### What do Tiles look like?

When Tile first launched on the back of a successful crowdfunding campaign six years ago, it resembled a key fob with a

loop. This still exists in the form of the Tile Mate but, like the entire range, it has been updated. As of October this year, Mate now has a range of 200 feet and a one-year replacement battery. There's also a Tile Pro (see main image), which offers twice the range and a louder ring, and a revised Tile Slim, which now resembles a credit card and gives you a 200ft range as well as a three-year, non-replaceable battery life. This is particularly ideal for wallets.


### Are they stickable?

Those Tile products are not, but the company has just released a new product called the Sticker ([bit.ly/sticker488](http://bit.ly/sticker488)) that weighs just 5g. Created

in partnership with adhesive experts 3M, it can be stuck to any item or device you want, giving a range of 150 feet. Tile suggests placing Stickers on a TV remote, a bike or a camera, and reckons the adhesive will last the duration of its three-year built-in battery life.

### What if my lost item is out of range?

Tile can determine the last place an item was registered - assuming the app was open and running in the background at the moment the item was lost. For example, suppose you leave your keys at the gym. This location would have been recorded so that, when you subsequently moved out of range, you'd be able to see its

last noted position, go back, and – with a bit of luck – find your keys still there. It’s also possible to get directions and ‘ring’ the Tile when you get close.

Problems can arise if the app wasn’t running at the time the item was lost. However, this is where Tile arguably comes into its own, since you’re then able to tap into its large, existing network of users for help with retrieving it.

### How does Tile’s community help find items?

Tile users form a Bluetooth-based peer-to-peer network and, if your item has truly gone astray, it’s possible to call on this community by tapping Notify When Found. This issues an alert in the hope that another user’s app will end up detecting your item as they wander past it. That person won’t know this has happened but the location of your Tile will be relayed back to you via a notification and an email, allowing you to pop back and collect it. You can then anonymously thank the user who inadvertently helped you.

### How big is the Tile network?

Recent figures suggest that Tile sold 22 million trackers across the world in 2017 and 2018, which means the network is potentially huge, depending on how many are actively in use. Tile is supplementing the standalone trackers by integrating the technology into other devices. A range of headphones by Skullcandy, for instance, have Tile technology built in, as do the Sennheiser Momentum 3 and Bose SoundSport Wireless headphones.

Tile has also attracted investment from telecommunications giant Comcast, which wants to place the technology in its set-top boxes, so they can be used to

locate lost objects (there’s a chance this could even come to Sky following the Comcast takeover). Other deals have been struck with Dialog Semiconductor, Cypress, Nordic Semiconductor, Silicon Labs, Toshiba and Qualcomm to integrate Tile technology with these manufacturers’ chips.



£34.99, a single Tile Pro costs £29.99 and a Mate is £19.99. The Slim costs £24.99, but there’s a combo pack that includes two Mates and two Slims for £69.99. None of these require a subscription but there’s also a Premium package that will notify you if you leave a location without a particular item.

This also includes free replacement batteries, 30-day location history and unlimited sharing, and costs from £2.50 per month.

### Are there any notable rivals?

Yes. As well as those cited in the boxout below, it’s worth mentioning the strong rumours that Apple is interested in launching its own tag tracker.

Screenshots taken from an internal build of iOS 13 in June appeared to suggest an Items tab will be coming to Apple’s Find My iPhone tool. Spotted by MacRumors, it is suggested that the tags will be fitted with the ultra-wideband U1 locator chip found in the iPhone 11 that can pinpoint items within centimetres of their location, and that the tags will pair with your iCloud account.



Chipolo has three products: Classic and Plus are colourful circular fobs, while the super-slim Card is designed for keeping in a wallet. Like Tile, Chipolo offers community search, an app and voice control, as well as custom ringtones, differing loudness depending on the device, and a range of 200 feet.



#### Orbit

[findorbit.com](http://findorbit.com)

In addition to a key finder, Orbit has has a stick-on tracker and a credit card-like device, a leather wallet with a built-in tracker and even a tiny device that is designed to be stuck to a pair of spectacles – handy if you’re always

losing your eyewear. The key finder’s range is just 100 feet, however.

#### Adero

[www.adero.com](http://www.adero.com)

Backed by Amazon and once known as TrackR, Adero made close to half its staff redundant earlier this year, but its main selling point is that its trackers work together to determine that, when carrying your bag around, everything you need is inside. The Smart Tags aim to prevent you losing stuff in the first place.



# STOP LEAKING YOUR IDENTITY


Are you inadvertently sharing sensitive information online? **Wayne Williams** reveals how you can identify data leaks and plug the holes in your privacy

It's becoming increasingly difficult to maintain your privacy online, however hard you try or whatever powerful protections you have in place. Nobody willingly surrenders their email address and password to a data breach, for example, but the frequency and scale of website hacks means it's almost impossible to avoid getting caught in one.

Fortunately, there are steps you can take to identify when, where and how your personal

information has been - or is likely to be - compromised, so you can plug the leaks before it's too late. In this feature, we reveal the best tools for detecting hidden holes in your online privacy, and explain how you can fix and prevent these vulnerabilities.

We also reveal the shocking truth of just how much your personal data is actually worth to the criminals who are trying to steal it (spoiler alert - it's nowhere near as much as you'd think).



## HAVE YOUR PASSWORDS BEEN STOLEN?


Everyone knows it's important to follow proper password etiquette and use unique and difficult-to-guess logins on every site you visit on the web. A combination of letters, numbers and symbols – rather than dictionary words or the names of family members or pets – should mean that attackers won't be able to easily crack your passwords.

The problem is that websites are hacked almost every day and passwords are leaked or stolen through no fault of the user. When that happens, the affected site should inform you and advise you to change your login details. However, sites often aren't as forthcoming as they should be, and they might not even discover the break-in for months, or even years, after it happens.

For this reason, it pays to change your password regularly – just in case – and use some of the many tools available that check whether your online accounts have been compromised, or are likely to be. Here's our pick of the best.

### Check if your accounts have been breached

Have I Been Pwned ([haveibeenpwned.com](http://haveibeenpwned.com)) is probably the best known privacy-leak checker and can tell you instantly if your email address was exposed in a breach and when that breach occurred. It also notifies you when your email account is compromised by future breaches.



The site can also check if any passwords you use appear on the web. Have some fun by entering some common (and easy to guess) passwords to see how often they've been leaked – 'password', for example, has appeared in data breaches 3.7 million times, while '123456' crops up a whopping 23.5 million times. See our Mini Workshop on page 42 to find out how to make the most of Have I Been Pwned.


Firefox Monitor ([monitor.firefox.com](http://monitor.firefox.com)) is a similar tool that checks to see if your email address has been compromised and gives details regarding the breaches that affect you. If you use Firefox, you'll receive a

notification when you visit a site that's been breached.

### Monitor multiple online accounts for leaks

Unlike many leak checkers, Spybot Identity Monitor ([bit.ly/spybotid488](http://bit.ly/spybotid488)) is a downloadable tool. Setting it up is simple – just click My Accounts, then click the buttons at the top to add as many email addresses and usernames as you like. It

monitors your details against the Have I Been Pwned database but delivers its results in one simple interface, rather than you having to check each account individually by entering the details on the Have I Been Pwned website.




Spybot Identity Monitor lets you check the security of multiple accounts

## IS YOUR DATA BEING SOLD ON THE DARK WEB?

The dark web is a collection of websites on an encrypted network that can only be accessed using the Tor Browser ([www.torproject.org/download](http://www.torproject.org/download)). It's home to lots of criminal activity – you can buy drugs, guns and counterfeit currency, as well as credit card numbers, stolen subscriptions, bank logins and usernames and passwords.

Dark websites look similar to regular sites, but they're harder to find (regular search engines don't index them) and end in '.onion', rather than '.com' or '.co.uk'. However, some companies claim they can scan the dark web and alert you if your personal information is found there. The trouble is that free scans don't usually reveal much, and many companies offering 'dark web scans' require you to sign up for a paid-for service. The truth is that the dark web is – by its very nature – very hard to scan, and most if not all of these services are probably just checking to see if your details appear on regular security sites such as Have I Been Pwned (see above). If your personal data was leaked in a breach, you can pretty much guarantee it will be somewhere on the dark web and, infuriatingly, you won't be able to remove it.



### Find out if your email address has leaked


Avast Hack Check ([www.avast.com/hackcheck](http://www.avast.com/hackcheck)) is a very thorough tool that lets you discover which, if any, of your passwords have been stolen. Enter your email address, click Check Now and the site will email you a link to your personal report, which will show you all the instances where your email address was purportedly found on the dark web, alongside any accompanying passwords. Hack Check will also alert you every time your email address and passwords leak in the future.

## Check if your passwords are compromised

Another way to check the strength and security of your passwords is to use Google's new Password Checkup tool, which you'll find in your Google account. Go to [passwords.google.com](https://passwords.google.com) and select the 'Check passwords' link toward the top of the page, then click the 'Check passwords' button on the next screen and log into your Google account again. After a few seconds, you'll be shown a total of the compromised passwords that were



found, the number of reused passwords and how many of your online accounts are protected with a weak password. Clicking the down arrow under

each section shows which sites are affected.

Click the 'Change password' button to visit the site in question or click the three-dot icon to the right of this button to view the troublesome password, and update it or delete it.

## Test the strength of your passwords


If you're confident that your passwords are so tough that no hacker stands a chance of cracking them, How Secure is My Password ([howsecureismypassword.net](https://howsecureismypassword.net)) and Kaspersky Password Check ([password.kaspersky.com](https://password.kaspersky.com)) will quickly disabuse you of this notion. Enter any password into either site and they will tell you how long it would take a computer to crack it. The results, however, can vary wildly - we entered '4camelshave8humps' and How Secure is My Password said it would take 227 million years to crack, while Kaspersky's tool said eight days, then later changed this to 6,920 centuries!

## Fake your email address and identity

One way to ensure your email address and passwords don't get compromised is to limit the number of places they

appear on the web. You can use a temporary email address from the likes of Temp Mail ([temp-mail.org](https://temp-mail.org)) on sites where you don't need to enter or share any real personal data, or that you're only likely to use once.

Another option is to create a fake identity to use when you register with websites and have to create profiles on them. Fake Name Generator ([www.fakenamegenerator.com](https://www.fakenamegenerator.com)) can build you an entirely fictitious identity, complete with a fake name, address (in a country of your choosing), phone number, email address (that actually works), date of birth and employer. Other information generated could include a fake credit card number, bank account and cryptocurrency address (don't try to use these for real!), as well as favourite colour, car make and model, and height, weight and blood type!





## ARE YOU SHARING TOO MUCH DATA?

The answer to the above question is pretty much guaranteed to be a resounding “yes!”, although there’s a good chance you won’t know exactly how much data you’re sharing. Browser add-ons, mobile apps and websites routinely request all sorts of permissions and most people blindly wave them through because denying them can create obstacles. If you say no to a permission requested by an app, for example, then it may not work as intended, or might not work at all. Sometimes, though, these permission requests are spurious and used to gather user data for advertising – or even malicious – purposes.

### Find out which apps can access your data

If you haven’t done so recently – or indeed, ever – it’s worth running an audit to see what data you’re sharing and revoke access to anything you don’t like the look of. MyPermissions ([mypermissions.com](http://mypermissions.com)) is a free privacy cleaner for Android and iOS that aims to show you which apps are accessing your personal data, and what permissions they have. Recent reviews have been rather scathing about the app’s effectiveness, however, so another option worth considering is aSpotCat – Permission Checker for Android ([bit.ly/aspot488](http://bit.ly/aspot488)).



### Prevent unwanted access to your accounts

Privacy Cleaner for Chrome ([bit.ly/priv488](http://bit.ly/priv488)), also from MyPermissions, scans major services, including Facebook and Twitter, for third-party tools that have been given permission to access your private info, so you can revoke unwanted permissions. Like the mobile app, we’ve found it to be a bit hit and miss, but it managed to uncover a couple of unwanted services when we used it, so it’s worth a try.

For Firefox users, there’s Project

Insight ([bit.ly/insight488](http://bit.ly/insight488)), which shows you the permissions granted to your installed add-ons, as well as the domains they are allowed to access. Once installed, just click the toolbar button in your browser and it will check all your add-ons and search sites (including the likes of eBay, Wikipedia and Amazon) with requested permissions. In many cases, websites will appear in the list purely because they are allowed to run in Private Browsing Mode.


### Discover which websites are tracking you

Who’s Watching You ([bit.ly/watching488](http://bit.ly/watching488)) doesn’t check which permissions you expressly granted, but rather looks into the privacy policies of some of the web’s biggest companies – including Facebook, Google, Amazon, Instagram, LinkedIn and Twitter – to see what details they track. Just click one of the icons to display a breakdown of the sort of things that site records. You can filter the list of sites to see which ones track your location, ignore Do Not Track requests, have access to your messages, record device information and usage, and actively engage with third-party sites (such as Facebook with its ubiquitous Like buttons).

### Tighten your privacy settings on Facebook

In the wake of last year’s Cambridge Analytica scandal, Facebook earned a reputation for not caring about user privacy and has been trying to win back trust by giving users more control over their data. One thing you can now do is run Facebook Security Checkup ([bit.ly/fbcheck488](http://bit.ly/fbcheck488)), which lets you see unused apps and browsers that you’ve logged into and gives you the chance to log out of them. You can enable Login Alerts, which will cause Facebook to let you know if your account gets logged into from an unrecognised device and browser, and you can also get some tips on password protection.

If you scroll down to the bottom of the window, you can open your Security Settings and, from here, see where




Facebook’s Security Checkup helps you tighten your privacy settings

you’re currently logged in from, change your password, enable two-factor authentication (2FA) and access privacy settings. This last option lets you control who can see your posts, see your list of friends and view your email address.

### Review the security of your Google account

Google also offers a Security Checkup tool ([bit.ly/gcheck488](http://bit.ly/gcheck488)), which shows you all devices that have accessed your Google account in the past, and lets you review any recent security events, in case there is cause for concern. Google is usually very good at alerting you via email when a new or unknown device accesses your account. You can also enable 2-step verification here, see which third-party apps have access to your data and remove any you’re unhappy with, and view and manage blocked email addresses (and other ‘sensitive’ settings) in Gmail.

## IS YOUR BROWSER LEAKING PERSONAL INFO?

Even if you take care to use strong login credentials and change them at the first sign of a security breach or after a set period of time, and even if you're very careful about what you share online and what permissions you grant, your personal information could still be at risk – without you even knowing. That's because your browser and other software could be revealing identifiable data about you. There are lots of tools you can use to check and stop this, and it's worth trying the following ones to detect and plug the leaks in your browser privacy.

### Test your web browser for privacy leaks

Irrespective of which browser you use – be it Chrome, Firefox, Edge, Vivaldi or something else – BrowserLeaks ([browserleaks.com](http://browserleaks.com)) can show you what personal data is being shared online without your knowledge or permission. The tool offers a number of tests covering IP Address, JavaScript, Flash Player, WebGL, Content Filters and Geolocation API. Just select a test and BrowserLeaks will immediately show you exactly what information is being leaked through your browser. In the case of the IP Address test, for example,

### Ensure your browser is blocking trackers

Most web browsers now offer a 'do not track' feature that, when enabled, will tell sites that you want to opt out of behavioural targeting (when adverts are tailored to your interests) and not be tracked. You can check to see whether this is switched on in your browser by looking in the Settings. In Chrome, click the three-dot button in the top-right corner of the browser and open Settings, then scroll

it will show your local and public IP addresses, ISP, country, city, connection type, latitude/longitude, DNS servers and browser type. It will also plot your current location on a map to reveal if you're unwittingly leaking details of where you are.

down, click Advanced and, under Privacy, make sure 'Send a 'Do Not Track' request with your browsing traffic' is enabled. In Firefox, click the three-line menu button and open Content Blocking. Mozilla's browser gives you two choices: you can send a Do Not Track signal 'Always' or 'Only when Firefox is set to block known trackers' (the default setting).

While 'Do Not Track' sounds like a great way to safeguard your privacy, websites are under no obligation to respect your request, and most don't. Panoptlick ([panoptlick.eff.org](http://panoptlick.eff.org)), from the Electronic Frontier Foundation, lets you check to see how well your browser and add-ons protect you against online tracking methods. You can run a sample test, or test your browser using a real tracking company. Just click the Test Me

## HOW MUCH IS YOUR PERSONAL DATA WORTH?

Your personal data is priceless to you, but to hackers and scammers, it's actually worth surprisingly little. Totally Money has a personal data quiz at [www.totallymoney.com/personal-data/](http://www.totallymoney.com/personal-data/) which lets you put a price on various types of basic personal information, such as your email address and telephone number, and then reveals the actual total worth, which really isn't much at all.

Top10VPN's Dark Web Market Price Index – 2019 (UK Edition) ([bit.ly/darkweb488](http://bit.ly/darkweb488)) looks at the price of some of the data you can find on the dark web, including hacked accounts for services such as Netflix and Fortnite. According to the site's research, an entire online identity is valued at just £770, while a Netflix account alone is worth £8.19, an Amazon account £14.53 and an Uber account £7.61. Facebook is valued at £6.96 and Twitter at £1.54.

Personal bank details were priced at £347.68, credit card details at £24.91, PayPal at £14.06, driving licence info at £13.28, passports at £9.93 and Gmail account logins at £4.48.

To arrive at its figures, Top10VPN reviewed tens of thousands of listings across five of the main dark web markets – Dream, Wallstreet, Empire, Berlusconi and Tochka Free. It focused on listings featuring stolen ID, personal data and hacked accounts, and excluded any massive data dumps.

This 2019 update to the UK edition of Price Index reveals hacked accounts are still cheap on the dark web: even big names like Apple, Fortnite, Netflix and Airbnb sell for less than £10.

button and wait while the scan runs. It will show you if your browser is blocking tracking ads and invisible trackers, and whether it stops those which are in the 'acceptable ads' whitelist. It also shows you whether your browser unblocks third parties that promise to honour Do Not Track.


## Scan your network's ports for vulnerabilities

Every IP address has thousands and thousands of ports – numbers which are added to the header of data packets transmitted on a network. These are used for routing traffic to where it needs to go. Certain ports, such as port 80 (HTTP), tend to be locked down but other common ports could be open and vulnerable to hackers. An open port essentially means that it's active and the computer is listening for connection requests. It's a bit like an open door to your PC and could potentially allow attackers to exploit vulnerabilities on your system. Most routers have a 'Stealth Mode' which is designed to make open ports less obvious to outsiders by hiding their status, and you can enable this in your router settings page (see the manual or underside of the router for instructions on how to access these settings).

To check the status and security of your ports, you can use GRC ShieldsUp ([www.grc.com/shieldsup](http://www.grc.com/shieldsup)). This online service runs a number of different tests, including checking for exposed Universal Plug n'Play (UPnP) protocols and the status of file sharing, common ports and all service ports, as well as browser header information.

## Check your browser for security holes


Ideally, you should make sure you're



running the newest version of your browser at all times because this will help protect you from the latest threats. Your browser should alert you when a new version is released, although you can manually check for a new update at any time. In Chrome, click the top-right three-dot menu and go to Help, About Google Chrome to check for any updates. In Firefox, click the three-line 'hamburger' button and go to Help, About Firefox.

To make sure your browser is properly protected, you can run Qualys Browser Check ([browsercheck.qualys.com](http://browsercheck.qualys.com)), which scans your browser and plugins looking for potential vulnerabilities and security holes. If it

finds a problem, it will provide information on the issue and give you the chance to fix it by downloading an update. The add-on works with all the major browsers and you have the option of installing a plugin to perform a thorough check or running a quick scan without it. ■

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# RENAME any device


You don't need to stick with the dull default names for devices. **Robert Irvine** explains the easiest ways to personalise your hardware and call it whatever you want



## WINDOWS PC

If you bought your PC or laptop with Windows 10 preinstalled, the chances are that its default name is something boring and impersonal such as LAPTOP-7K916AKM. Equally, if your computer had a previous owner, its name may be something like SUSANS-PC, which can prove annoying if your name isn't Susan. Fortunately, it's very easy to rename your system to something more suitable. Open the Windows 10 Start menu and choose Settings, then click System, About. In the 'Device specifications' section, click the 'Rename this PC' button and enter your desired PC name - this can include letters, numbers and hyphens, but no spaces or special characters. Click Next then restart your PC to confirm the change.


In Windows 7 or 8.1, you can rename your computer by opening the Control Panel and choosing 'System and Security', System, 'Advanced system settings'. Click the Computer Name tab at the top of the System Properties box, then click the Change button, type your new PC name and click OK.

## APPLE MAC


On a macOS desktop computer or MacBook, click the Apple menu in the top-left corner of your screen and select System Preferences. Select the Sharing button in the Internet & Network section and type a new name for your Mac in the Computer Name box at the top of the window. This will appear on your home network and be displayed internally on your computer.

## LINUX PC

The exact procedure for renaming a Linux computer differs between distributions, but if you're running Linux Mint or another Ubuntu-based Linux distro, you can usually do so by editing the 'hostname' file. Press Ctrl+Alt+T to open a terminal window, then type `sudo gedit /etc/hostname` and press Enter to open the file in the graphical Gedit text editor. Delete the existing hostname from the file, replace

it with your new desired PC name and click Save.


Next, you'll need to edit the 'hosts' file, which also contains your PC's default name. Type `sudo gedit /etc/hosts` in a terminal window, press Enter and look for the hostname in the file that opens (this should be in a line that begins 127.0.1 or similar). Again, replace this with your preferred name and save the text file.

Reboot your PC to apply the changes and confirm its new name. For other Linux distros, search the web for "change hostname on [name of Linux distribution]" to get instructions.

## WIRELESS ROUTER

If you leave your router's name - known as the Service Set Identifier (SSID) - set to the default of something like 'BTHomeHub-1234', other people can identify its make. This potentially gives hackers the info they need to target your network, particularly if your router has a known flaw. It also makes your SSID easy to mistake for neighbours' networks that have similarly generic names.

To rename your SSID, open your web browser and log into your router settings. The IP address is usually something like 192.168.0.1 - check the


label on your router for details or search for your device on the Router IP Address database ([www.routeripaddress.com](http://www.routeripaddress.com)). Find the entry Wireless Network Name (SSID) or similar and enter the new name. For security reasons, it's best not to include your own name, address or other identifying details in the SSID, although you can have fun and call it something quirky like 'Tell My Wi-Fi Love Her', 'Get your own damn router' or 'Please stop your dog barking'. Apply the change, reboot your router and reconnect any disconnected devices to the renamed SSID.

### **ANDROID DEVICE**


The default name of your Android phone or tablet is usually set by the manufacturer - for example, 'moto g7 plus' - which is both boring and unoriginal. It's just as well, then, that renaming your device is very simple and means you can properly stamp your identity on it.

Go to Settings, System and tap 'About phone', 'About tablet' or 'About device'. Select 'Device name', enter your chosen moniker for your phone or tablet, and press OK. You may see a warning that this name may be visible to other people when you connect to Bluetooth devices. To find out, go to Settings, Bluetooth (or 'Connected devices') and tap 'Pair new device'. This will turn on Bluetooth and let you view and edit the device name that other people can see.

You can also change the device name(s) used by the Google Play store when you install Android apps and

download other content. Go to [play.google.com/settings](http://play.google.com/settings) to view your list of recognised devices, then click the Edit button next to one to give it a new nickname. Choose Update to confirm and this nickname will now appear in the list of options when you click to install an app. Repeat for your other Android devices as necessary.

### **iPHONE & iPAD**

It really couldn't be simpler to change the name of your iPhone or iPad, no matter which version of iOS you're using. Just go to Settings,




**Apple makes renaming your iPhone or iPad incredibly easy**

General, About and press the Name field. Type what you want to call your device and tap Done. The new name will be recognised by iCloud, iTunes and AirDrop, and appear when you use Apple's Find My iPhone/iPad tool to track down a lost or stolen device.

### **PRINTER**

When you set up a printer, Windows typically names it after the manufacturer or model. You can rename

it by going into the Control Panel and choosing 'Devices and Printers' (or 'View devices and printers'). Double-click your default printer, then double-click Customize Your Printer to open the Properties box. On the General tab, delete the printer's current name, enter a new one and click OK. The Model name is displayed on the same tab if you want to restore it later. ■



## **YOU CAN'T CALL ME AL(EXA)**

 Tired of starting every command to your Echo speaker with "Hey Alexa..."? If you have a relative or pet called Alexa (or even Alex), they're undoubtedly sick of it too, so you can either persuade them to change their name or set the device's 'wake word' to something else.

Open the Alexa app on your phone or tablet, open the menu in the top-left corner and choose Settings, Device Settings. In the All Devices list, select the Echo or other Alexa-enabled device whose name you want to change, then choose Wake Word. Here you can switch from saying



'Alexa' to addressing your device as Amazon, Computer or Echo instead - not particularly exciting options, but a change is as good as a rest!

Sadly, Google won't let you address its smart speakers as anything other than "OK/Hey Google", though the option to change this was reportedly tested last year.

# SECRET TIPS for WhatsApp


It's the best and most popular messaging app but are you getting the most out of it?

**Jane Hoskyn** reveals the latest expert tricks for mastering WhatsApp



## Unsend embarrassing messages

Don't panic! WhatsApp now lets you 'unsend' accidentally dispatched messages. Long-press the message, tap the bin icon and select Delete For Everyone. This erases the offending text from your recipient's screen as well as your own, whether or not it's been read. The catch is that you can only unsend a message for up to an hour and your recipient will see 'This message was deleted', which may leave them feeling even more determined to find out what they missed.




*WhatsApp lets you delete sent messages, if you're quick - but everyone will know*

## Hide yourself and your blue ticks

WhatsApp encrypts your messages in transit, but it's hardly a fortress of privacy. By default, it reveals when you're online, what time you were last active and when you've read messages. To switch off these intrusions, open Settings via WhatsApp's main menu then go to Account, Privacy. Tap 'Last seen', then Nobody (to hide the 'online' tag) and disable 'Read receipts' to stop the blue ticks.

Disabling blue ticks also prevents you from seeing when recipients read your messages, so you could keep them switched on and use this alternative




*Go incognito and ditch the blue ticks to stop WhatsApp revealing your every move*

trick instead: set your device to display full messages in notifications. On iOS, you could also get Siri to read them out and, in Chrome, you can use free extension WAToolkit to display notifications (see boxout, opposite). That way, you can read incoming messages without opening WhatsApp and triggering a read receipt.

## Save private audio notes

The microphone icon in the bottom-right corner of WhatsApp's message window works like a walkie-talkie button. Press and hold it, record a voice message, then let go to instantly send it. You can cancel before sending by swiping left, or enable hands-free mode by sliding your finger up to the lock icon while recording.

With a bit of trickery, this feature also works as a private dictaphone for recording ideas. First add your own




*Turn WhatsApp's audio message feature into a private dictaphone*

number as a contact (tap the green message button then 'New contact', 'Create contact'), then start a thread ('chat') with yourself and get talking. On Android, the audio files are saved in WhatsApp\Media\Audio files as well as in the app; on iOS they're saved in the app only.

## Share your live location

WhatsApp now lets you share your device's location in real time, so your recipient can track exactly where you are, which is handy when meeting in an unfamiliar place. Open a chat with that person, then tap the 'attach' icon (paperclip on Android; '+' on iOS) and choose Location from the attachment options (which also include audio files,




*Give a friend temporary tracking privileges to help with a rendezvous*



documents, photos and contacts). Allow location access, then select 'Share live location' and choose how long they can track you for. You can tap 'Stop sharing' in the chat to shut down the tracking once you've succeeded in meeting up.

## See who you chat to most


WhatsApp's 'Storage usage' screen is designed to reveal how much space you're using, but it's also a handy way to monitor your chat habits. Tap 'Data and storage usage' in Settings, then 'Storage usage' to see all your chats and how much space each one is taking up, with the largest at the top. Tap a person for a megabyte-by-megabyte breakdown of the types of media they use to communicate with you.




Find out whose chats take up most space - and what data types are responsible

## Delete space-hogging chats (except the best bits)

You don't have to delete entire chats to free up storage space. Tap a chat under 'Storage usage', then Free Up Space and tick the stuff you want to clear. For example, just GIFs and videos or everything except text. Alternatively, delete everything except 'starred' messages (add a star by long-pressing a favourite message). Open a chat's menu and tap More, 'Clear chat'. Make sure that 'Delete starred messages' is unticked and then tap Clear Messages.

## Back up and restore your WhatsApp chats


WhatsApp chats aren't stored in your account so, if you're switching to a new device, you'll need to import a backup from Google Drive or iCloud. To save a regular automatic backup, go to Chats, 'Chat backup' in Settings, then decide the backup frequency and whether to include videos and use mobile data. Be aware that chats are only encrypted in WhatsApp, not after they're backed up in the cloud.

To import a backup, install WhatsApp on a new device and follow the prompts. Sadly, you can't do this across platforms so chats backed up from Android can only be restored on Android and the same restriction applies to iOS.

## Download a whole chat as a text file

WhatsApp lets you export entire message threads as plain text files, complete with timestamps. Open the chat's menu and tap More, 'Export chat', then choose email and enter a recipient (such as yourself), then Send. You'll see

plenty of other export options, depending on your devices and apps. Ours included Bluetooth, messaging service Telegram and even nearby devices including our neighbour's Fire Stick, which we discreetly ignored!

## Message multiple people without using groups

WhatsApp group-notification nightmare season (more commonly known as Christmas) is almost upon us. Happily, there is a way to message multiple contacts in one go without triggering a notification pile-on: add them to a 'broadcast' - WhatsApp's version of email's BCC (blind copy).


Open the main menu from the Chats tab, tap 'New broadcast', select your contacts and tap the tick to create your message. The recipients won't see each other and they'll only get your message if you're in their contacts.

Annoyingly, you can't stop people adding you to WhatsApp groups - this feature is currently only available in India. While we wait for the new opt-out, we suggest muting a group chat until it's less active, by selecting 'Mute notifications' in the chat's menu. ■

## IMPROVE WHATSAPP WITH EXTENSIONS

WhatsApp supports third-party extensions but there's no built-in way to add them, so we've trawled app stores and developers' sites to round up the best - and they're all free.

- Transcriber (Android: [bit.ly/transc488](http://bit.ly/transc488)); Audio to Text (iOS: [bit.ly/audiotext488](http://bit.ly/audiotext488)): Automatically convert WhatsApp voice messages to text.
- WhatsApp Business (Android, iOS: [whatsapp.com/business](http://whatsapp.com/business)): Use two numbers on one phone, add chat labels and create auto-responses.
- WikiBot (Android, iOS: [bit.ly/wikibot488](http://bit.ly/wikibot488)): Send it any word and it'll reply with a Wikipedia definition.
- WAToolkit (Chrome: [bit.ly/wat488](http://bit.ly/wat488)): Configure text size in WhatsApp Web ([web.whatsapp.com](http://web.whatsapp.com)) and get



notifications, even when you close the page.

- Hide Media (Chrome: [bit.ly/hidem488](http://bit.ly/hidem488)): Hide photos and videos in WhatsApp Web - useful for slow connections and privacy from passers-by (see screenshot, above).

# Best free office suites

There's no need to pay for Microsoft Office with so many free alternatives now available. **Andy Shaw** ranks his favourite tools for word processing, spreadsheets and more

## What we liked:

*Web User* used to separate cloud-based office tools from the versions you can install in Windows, because they fitted a different purpose. But now that offline suites let you save your files online, and browser-based software can be saved to your hard drive and operated without an internet connection, the dividing line between the two has more or less vanished.

In our opinion, Google's suite of online, cloud-based tools (Docs, Sheets, Slides and Forms) is the king of the free office suite, whether you're online or off. Its tools aren't as comprehensive as LibreOffice's, and office-software experts might scoff at its limitations, but we think they're missing the point. Google's tools have just enough scope to keep most small offices running and they are more than capable of fulfilling the needs of the average home user.

Google has the essential core trio of tools covered: Docs is a capable word processor that can churn out anything from a simple letter to a lengthy book, while Sheets and Slides offer all the necessary tools for creating spreadsheets and presentations. You'd have to be relying on some very obscure


features to find yourself hitting a brick wall with any one of these tools.

The online nature of Google Docs makes collaboration simple, which is ideal when sharing and organising documents with family and friends.

Also, any files you save won't count against Google's free storage limits, so you can keep as many documents and spreadsheets within the system as you like.

## How it can be improved:

Although Google Docs covers all the basics well, there are some useful tools that this office suite lacks. A permanent on-screen word count has been on the wish list of writers for some time, and there's no option to add visible versions of invisible elements, such as spaces, to make editing easier. The other tools have similar minor shortfalls.



## OUR VERDICT

There are noticeable gaps in Google's toolbox compared to the more comprehensive LibreOffice, but Docs and Sheets have more to offer than just raw tools, including comprehensive collaboration, access from any device you can lay your hands on and unlimited file storage. Unless you need a specific tool or Microsoft Office-only file compatibility, this suite of core tools is enough to satisfy all your home office requirements.




**What we liked:**

Compared to most office software, LibreOffice now feels quaintly old fashioned. Eschewing many of the leaps to modernisation that other office products have attempted, such as Microsoft's ribbon bar, LibreOffice sticks with the old design of standard toolbars and menus we've used for years.

It operates as a traditional suite of tools with a variety of individual programs, including a word processor, spreadsheet, database, presentation tool and drawing program. This is a more comprehensive collection than that offered by Google, so it's the better option if you want the extras.

By default, files you create in LibreOffice are saved in the Open Document Format, which is fine if you're creating files for yourself but likely to confuse other people if you share them. However, with a few extra clicks, LibreOffice will save files as Microsoft documents and can also do fancy things such as saving PDFs.

There's nothing innovative about LibreOffice - if anything, the OpenOffice software it sprang from has done more to change and improve its tools. Sure, if it ain't broke don't fix it, but LibreOffice can feel a bit bleak and utilitarian.

**OUR VERDICT**

LibreOffice's old-school menus and buttons, and its traditional blueprint of individual Windows-based office tools accessed from a launcher may seem dowdy compared to Google's online offering, but it has more sophisticated office features.

If you're solidly on board with the way Windows 10 integrates with OneDrive, you might prefer to use Microsoft's online office suite, which has strong links with the company's paid-for Office software but is free to use and surprisingly capable.

The suite provides Word, Excel, Powerpoint and OneNote, which should cover most of the tools required by the home user. Like Google's offering, it also neatly bridges the divide between your desktop and the cloud, working online when you need it but neatly syncing your files offline if you have Windows 10 set to operate in conjunction with OneDrive.

A further benefit is that, being Microsoft, its files are Office-compatible by default, so if you work and share files with other people and organisations that use Microsoft's tools (which is almost everyone), then you'll have perfectly compatible files without even having to think about it.



**How it can be improved:**

The Excel Spreadsheet component has a modern ribbon bar, which brings it in line with Microsoft's paid-for software. However, the Word and PowerPoint tools are lagging behind, with simplistic menus and buttons, and need updating.

**OUR VERDICT**


Microsoft Office continues to rule paid-for office software, which lends its free online suite some gravitas. It's the sensible option if you need Microsoft Office compatibility but it's less coherent than our other award winners, with some tools lacking updates.


WPS Office has four main components to its office suite: a word processor, a spreadsheet, a presentation tool and a PDF editor. You have to sign up for an account to use the free service, but it comes with a generous 1GB of online space for storing and syncing your files. It feels more modern than LibreOffice but holds back some of its best features for paying customers.



**OpenOffice**

OpenOffice is LibreOffice's big brother and also needs installing on your PC. With both being developed from the same base software, there's a lot of similarity between the two, though OpenOffice isn't updated as often. It also doesn't come with the Charts tool, which you may not need but it's good to have the option.



**Apple iCloud**

Apple has its own suite of software that it gives away to Mac users for free, though it's not available on Windows. However, you can use its online tools for free if you sign up for an Apple account. These are a poor relation to Google and Microsoft's tools, though, unless you've bought into Apple's hardware. Even then, you're probably still better off looking at our award-winners instead.

## Get the most from iPadOS

Apple has created a version of iOS specifically for iPads, with new features that aren't available on the iPhone. Here's what you need to know


The iPad debuted in 2010, and Apple has rolled out new models and revisions every year since. Until recently, the tablet ran the same iOS operating system as the iPhone, but now Apple has designed a special iPad-only version called iPadOS that makes better use of the larger device's size and capabilities. Among the

additions are a new home screen, better multitasking features, the ability to download fonts from the App Store and changes to Safari. Mac users who update to macOS Catalina can even use their iPad as a wireless second display.


The new iPadOS is quite different from iOS but in this Workshop we'll walk you through the highlights.




**1** The new home screen in iPadOS lets you display widgets alongside your apps. Swipe in from the left to see the new Today View, **1** which includes calendar events, news stories, Siri app suggestions, weather and more. You can add this permanently to the home screen. **2**



**2** To customise the Today View, scroll down to the bottom of the sidebar and tap the Edit button. You can reorder the widgets by tapping and dragging the three lines next to an item. **1** Move your favourites to the pinned area. **2** Scroll down to see many more widgets you can add to the view.




**3** As with iOS 13, the new iPadOS offers a dark mode. Enable or disable it by going to Settings, 'Display & Brightness'. **1** Select Light **2** or Dark mode, **3** and it changes immediately. Switch on Automatic **4** and the mode changes depending on the time of day (Dark at night).



**4** With iPadOS, Apple has made better use of the screen space, cramming up to 30 app icons on each page. If you prefer the old look, go to the bottom of the Display & Brightness screen, where you can switch between the More **1** and Bigger **2** options. You can add or remove the Today View here, too. **3**




**5** The Slide Over feature lets you place one app on top of another. While using an app, swipe up from the bottom edge to reveal the dock. **1** Tap the app you want to slide over, then drag it to the side of the screen. It will appear as a floating sidebar. **2** You can interact with the second app as usual there.




**SHORTCUTS APP**  
This app is now part of iPadOS and lets you create new shortcuts to tasks you perform regularly, such as 'Get current weather' or 'Add new event to Calendar'


**SAFARI**  
The iPad's default web browser now shows you the desktop version of any websites you visit, rather than the mobile one



**6** Once you have an app open in Slide Over, you can swipe it out of sight or move it to the other side of the screen. You can have several apps open in a Slide Over window. Swipe the line on the bottom of the bar **1** to switch between apps. **2** Swiping the line upwards reveals all your open apps.



**7** Drag the line at the top of the Slide Over window **1** to the centre of the iPad's display to make that app full screen. There's also a Split View, which is similar but displays two apps side by side. **2** Repeat the process for Slide Over but drag the app to the far edge. Drag the divider **3** to resize the windows.



**8** Apple has redesigned its Photos app on both iOS and iPadOS. Now you can view all photos or reorder them by years, months or days. **1** You can also change the look of the thumbnails from Square to Aspect (making it easier to identify horizontal and vertical shots) **2** and zoom in or out. **3**


### Steve Clark says

To try the latest version of Windows 10 before it's rolled out to your PC, sign up to the Windows Insider Programme - search for windows insider in the Start bar to join the club. Sign in and select one of four options, ranging from the more stable Slow ring to the hyper-beta Skip ring. Once you're set up, keep checking for new updates. Be aware that some of the bigger 'feature' updates can take a while to install.





The Windows 10 November 2019 Update is the latest feature update for Microsoft's ever-evolving operating system. Due to go live mid-November, it may have launched by the time you read this. If it's not reached your PC yet, you can either wait for the update to arrive or accelerate the process by following our Expert Tip, right.

Many of the update's changes are 'under the hood,' including the vague tease of "general battery life and power efficiency improvements for PCs with certain processors", so don't expect a massive overhaul on the scale of version 1903 (the May update). It seems we're at the 'tweaking and refining' stage of Windows 10's life cycle, though there's still plenty to get stuck into, especially around notifications and voice control.



**1** The first big change in the November update allows you to add other voice assistants to the lock screen. Start by downloading your chosen assistant - we're using Alexa. Open the app and click the menu **1** to visit the Settings. Toggle on both Hands-Free **2** and Lock Screen Access, **3** so you can summon your assistant even when the computer's locked.

**2** If you're happy to use Cortana, search the Start bar for voice activation. Turn on 'Allow apps to use voice activation' and 'Allow apps to use voice activation when this device is locked'. **1** Under Cortana, toggle on both 'Let Cortana respond to keyword' and 'Use Cortana even when my device is locked'. **2**



**3** Calendar events have become less clunky. The old method was to select a date in the calendar, **1** click the '+' icon **2** to open the Outlook calendar **3** and add a raft of details - event name, location, times, invitees **4** - before finally clicking Save. **5** This was pointlessly cumbersome for on-the-fly entries such as 'Pick up milk'.

**4** Compare that to the November update: select your date and you can immediately begin typing in the text field. **1** This displays options to change the colour, **2** add start and finish times **3** and include locations. **4** Click Save or click 'More details' **5** to open Outlook calendar, if you wish to add something more complex than a basic event.


**5** Notifications are now displayed at the top of the Action Centre, which makes them easier to keep an eye on. Click the Action Centre, **1** then 'Manage notifications'. **2** The Notifications section has a new tickbox 'Allow notifications to play sounds', **3** which is applied universally rather than on an individual per-app basis.

**6** Staying in the 'Notifications & actions' window, scroll down to 'Get notifications from these apps'. **1** You can sort the app list by 'Most recent' **2** and Name. Click any app to see how updates will appear. You can choose between banners **3** and Action Centre notifications, **4** or untick both to stop seeing them at all.



**7** The final update to notifications comes in the form of dismissals. When you get a notification, either as a banner or in the Action Centre, right-click it. Previously, you were given the option to turn off specific notifications; now, it lets you 'Go to notification settings' or 'Turn off all notifications for' that particular app. **1**

**8** File Explorer has also received an upgrade. Now that it's powered by Windows Search, which marries OneDrive to traditional indexed search, it's a lot quicker and more intuitive. When you start typing in the search box, **1** a list of matches appears below **2** so you no longer have to wait for individual results to come through.



**9** The Narrator app can 'read' your keyboard's function keys and knows whether the Function Key Lock is activated. To check it's working, search for narrator. When the app loads, the new changes are explained. You don't have to make any other adjustments, just make sure you tick 'Don't show again' **1** and click OK **2** or it'll pop up every time.

**10** Open the Start menu **1** to see the familiar app list and live tiles. **2** The navigation panel on the left **3** contains five icons - Account, Document, Pictures, Settings and Power. **4** Previously, you had to hover over these to get an individual tool tip; now, you get a section describing every icon.





## Record your screen from your browser



A screen recorder is a useful tool to have to hand, whether you want to show someone how to fix a particular problem or share your skills by demonstrating how to use your favourite software. RecordScreen is a browser-based



tool that lets you capture footage and audio from your computer, and it's completely free. There's no need to buy or even download any software – just bookmark this site.



**1** Visit [recordscreen.io](https://recordscreen.io) and press the Record button. Rather than beginning a recording, the site sends you to the setup page. Select either 'Screen + Cam' or Screen Only. **1** When you're ready, click Start Recording, **2** then grant permissions to use the mic, the camera and to share the screen. **3**

**2** If you choose to record 'Screen + Cam', **1** you can set up the position of your camera's placement. **2** By default, it's located in the bottom-left corner but if you'd like to move it to a different spot, click and drag when you see the cross-hair cursor to move it into position.



**3** Next, a pop-up lets you choose which part of your screen to record, either via the tabs across the top or, in some browsers, a drop-down menu. Select between your current screen or display, **1** or a specific program or browser window. **2** Click Share **3** or OK to start your recording.

**4** A display in the centre of the screen shows what's being recorded. **1** A notice at the top informs you that there's a 'Recording in progress'. **2** You can now switch between tabs and programs – everything that happens on screen is captured. When you're done, click Stop Recording. **3**



**5** Once the recording has finished, the display becomes a playback video with a timeline and Play button. **1** You can adjust volume and expand the window full-screen. Click the three-dot menu for options to download the video **2** or watch your recording in Picture-in-Picture mode. **3**

**6** Once you're satisfied with your recording, click Download Video. **1** The clip appears in the default downloads folder. To scrap the video, click Close. **2** Be warned – this means you can't retrieve your video later, and there's no confirmation box should you decide to change your mind.






**1** When you first launch AntennaPod, it opens the menu. Start by tapping the Add Podcast option. Here, you can search for a podcast you know the name of, **1** browse through AntennaPod's recommendations, **2** type in the URL if you know it **3** or import an OPML list of podcasts from another app. **4**



**2** Once you've found the podcast you want, tap it and you're taken to a list of episodes, **1** which may be long if the podcast has been around for a while. This is just a preview page, to show you what's available. If you like what you see, tap the Subscribe button **2** to add the podcast to AntennaPod, then tap the Open Podcast button.




**3** You can now start downloading the episodes you want to listen to. Tap the down arrow **1** next to a podcast to start downloading. If you change your mind, tap the cross. **2** Once an episode has downloaded, you can play it by tapping the Play button. **3** Tap the Ear icon. **4**



**4** This opens the page for that particular episode, where you can Play **1** or Delete it. Click the menu for more options, including managing the episode in your playback queue, **2** resetting how far you've got through it **3** and adding it to your Favorites. **4**



**5** Back on the subscription page, you can filter the list of episodes. Tap Search to find a particular show to listen to, **1** filter out episodes based on certain criteria, **2** select more than one episode at a time (useful for mass deletion) **3** and refresh the list. **4**



**6** From the homepage, you can access all your subscriptions by tapping the menu button. Here, you can jump to the various different options for accessing your podcasts, such as episodes you haven't heard yet, **1** or skip straight back to your subscriptions. **2** Tap Settings **3** for more options for organising, downloading and listening to your podcasts.

## Play old games on your Windows 10 PC

Wayne Williams delves into his gaming archives to find classic titles that he can still play on his modern PC

It's fun to revisit your youth from time to time, listening to old songs you've not heard in years or sitting back to watch a film you vividly recall going to see at the cinema. Playing old games that you used to enjoy but haven't thought about in a long time can be equally rewarding, giving you a chance to complete a title you always meant to go back to or unlocking long dormant skills, such as remembering how to rocket-jump in the original Quake. Sadly, firing up an old PC game isn't always as straightforward as you might expect, and there's no guarantee it will run on modern hardware or in Windows 10. But where there's a will to play old games, there's a way, as we'll show you in this issue's Weekend Project.



### Where to get old games


You may have a pile of old games gathering dust in the loft or the garage that you can use but, failing that, you can pick up old titles from charity shops, car boot sales or eBay.

Some publishers have released old titles as freeware so, if you missed them at the time, you can catch up for free. Wikipedia has a comprehensive list of once commercial games that are now

free at [bit.ly/freew488](http://bit.ly/freew488).

There are some true classics on this list, including Command & Conquer: Red Alert ([bit.ly/redal488](http://bit.ly/redal488)), StarCraft ([bit.ly/starcr488](http://bit.ly/starcr488)), Elder Scrolls II: Daggerfall ([bit.ly/dagg488](http://bit.ly/dagg488)), OpenTTD (an open source version of Transport Tycoon Deluxe at [www.openttd.org](http://www.openttd.org))


and Beneath a Steel Sky ([bit.ly/beneath488](http://bit.ly/beneath488)).

### Run games in Admin mode

If you manage to install an old Windows game but can't get it to start, try running it in Administrator mode. Some titles require permissions, which the less security-minded XP was happy to grant, but Windows 10 isn't as relaxed and its standard mode has more restrictions in place. To get around this, try right-clicking the program's executable and selecting 'Run as administrator'.

If that doesn't work, try compatibility mode (follow our Mini Workshop, below). You can also play DOS games in a special emulator called DOSBox - we show you how to set this up on page 61.



### Community patches

If you manage to get an old game running in Windows 10, you may be shocked by how poor the graphics and gameplay seem in comparison to modern titles. Don't worry, other people have spotted this too and, if a game was or still is popular enough, someone may have produced a patch for it that unlocks modern graphics capabilities, increasing the resolution and more. You can check to see if your game has been improved by searching Google for

gamename unofficial patch (replacing gamename with the actual name of the game) or gamename community patch. GOG ([www.gog.com](http://www.gog.com)) and Steam ([steamcommunity.com](http://steamcommunity.com)) both have active community forums that are worth exploring.

Fans of games such as Doom, Doom2, Heretic, Hexen and Strife can upgrade an old version to the latest release at DoomWorld ([bit.ly/doom488](http://bit.ly/doom488)).


### Play DOS games on the web

Back in 2015, the Internet Archive added 2,400 playable DOS games to its site at [bit.ly/iados488](http://bit.ly/iados488). A few more titles followed and then, as we reported in last issue's What's New Online, the site has now introduced another 2,500 games to its library, bringing the total to just shy of 7,000. All of them can be played for free in your web browser.


The list of titles on offer is impressive and includes 90s classics such as Duke Nukem 3D, Prince of Persia, Sim City, Championship Manager, Eye of the Beholder, The Incredible Machine, Wolfenstein 3D, The Curse of Monkey Island and Microsoft Flight Simulator. Most of the games play without any




## MINI WORKSHOP | Run old games in compatibility mode



**1** If a game won't run in Windows 10 and Admin mode doesn't fix this, try fooling the software into thinking it's running on an older operating system. Right-click the program's EXE file and select Properties. In the next window, click the Compatibility tab. **1** Tick the box next to 'Run this program in compatibility mode for'. **2**



**2** Click the drop-down menu underneath and you're presented with a list of past Windows versions, from Windows 95 to Windows 8. **1** You can try any version but it's best to choose the operating system that your game would have originally run on. There are other settings available, too, **2** including Admin mode. **3**



**3** Apply and OK the change, then run your game again. If it still doesn't work, try another operating system or use the compatibility troubleshooter. Right-click the game's EXE file and select 'Troubleshoot compatibility'. You can try the recommended settings **1** or troubleshoot the game by answering various questions.

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

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
issues but some have a few glitches and may run a little slow. Not all the games come with a manual so you may need to do some research on the web to find out how to play them.

### Emulators and remakes

There are several ways to enjoy non-PC games – one is to use an emulator to play the originals, or you can opt for a remake instead. There are emulators for all past systems, from the ZX Spectrum and Commodore 64 to the PlayStation, and the games that run on them come in the form of ROMs, which you can find with the help of Google, though downloading and playing a game you never bought in the first place is understandably frowned upon by the games publishers.

While remakes offer a simpler way to enjoy past games – you just download and install them – they aren't always faithful copies. A lot of remakes will "improve" on the graphics and sound, and add different elements to the game play. We're a big fan of Crozza Remakes ([bit.ly/croz488](http://bit.ly/croz488)) which has a lot of excellent modern versions of classic games, such as Asteroids, Manic Miner, Donkey Kong, Pacman and Mario Bros.


### Play old arcade games

You can transform your PC into an arcade machine that plays all the old classics using Multiple Arcade Machine Emulator, or MAME for short ([www.mamedev.org](http://www.mamedev.org)). It's very easy to use – just unzip the program to a folder on your hard drive and add the games you want to play to MAME's Roms directory. The

MAME site has a collection of free legal ROMs at [mamedev.org/roms](http://mamedev.org/roms) but you're unlikely to be familiar with any of them. If you want to play the classic titles, you'll need to search elsewhere. When you run the emulator, it lists all the installed games available to play and you can choose the one you want.

If you don't want to go to the hassle of installing an emulator and finding ROMs for it, you can also


try the Internet Archive's Internet Arcade ([bit.ly/intarc488](http://bit.ly/intarc488)), which contains over 1,700 arcade games you can play in your browser, including Defender, Paperboy, Q\*Bert, Tron, Marble Madness and Tetris. You can play them in a window or in full-screen mode. ■





## MINI WORKSHOP | Get old PC games running using DOSBox



**1** Trying to get old games that were written for MS-DOS to run on a modern PC can be frustrating. DOSBox ([www.dosbox.com](http://www.dosbox.com)) software aims to emulate DOS and opens in a familiar looking black window, similar to a Command prompt, **1** with instructions on how to run the software.



**2** Either copy the original game to your hard drive, insert the CD or download a file from [www.dosgamesarchive.com](http://www.dosgamesarchive.com). Mount the folder the game is in by typing `mount` in the DOS box, followed by the drive letter and directory. For example, `mount c c:\game` makes the Game directory your new C: drive. **1**



**3** Type `c:` to switch to that drive or game, then `dir` to see the files. You should now be able to install or run your game. Switch to full screen by pressing `Alt+Enter`. Edit the configuration file to change settings and speed up or slow down a game by using `Ctrl+F11` or `Ctrl+F12`.

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

## Speed up Windows startup to get your PC working faster

### Use Windows' Sleep mode to wake your PC faster

**T**he most obvious way to reduce the time spent waiting for your PC to start up is to avoid shutting it down in the first place. Instead, put it into Sleep mode. Windows resumes from sleep in a fraction of the time it takes to start from cold. To enter Sleep mode, click Start, Power, Sleep.

That's all very simple but it could be even simpler. Open the Control Panel and click Power Options followed by 'Choose what the power buttons do'. The options may vary depending on whether you have a desktop or laptop PC, because desktops don't have a lid you can close to shut them down. Set all options to Sleep. Now you can press the power button to send your PC to sleep. It's like putting your TV into standby and uses very little power. Tap a key, the mouse or the trackpad and the PC starts up in seconds instead of minutes.

### Hibernate for fast startup

Computers use a small amount of power while in Sleep mode, which means a laptop's battery will eventually run out if left in that state for a long time. It may take a week or more, and the battery will lose only a few per cent of power overnight, but you may not want even this tiny amount of drain. If that's the case, use Hibernate instead of Sleep.

Many computers support Hibernate, which is very similar to Sleep mode but without the power drain. In Hibernate mode, Windows saves a snapshot of the current state of the computer to the hard drive before powering off. When you power the PC back on, it loads the snapshot and you can continue working



*Set Windows to enter hibernate mode if you worry that sleep mode might drain your battery*

on whatever you had open when you finished last time. Resuming from Hibernate is still faster than a cold start.

Open the Control Panel and click Power Options, then 'Choose what the power buttons do'. Click the link labelled 'Change settings that are currently unavailable'. Enable the Hibernate option, then restart Windows. Now when you click Start, Power, you'll see a new Hibernate option on the menu. Use this instead of shutting down your PC or using Sleep mode.

### Stop background apps

If you have a lot of programs running in the background, they may start when Windows starts, which can use up valuable resources and cause bottlenecks on your PC. Open Settings, Privacy, 'Background apps' and use the switches to disable any you don't need. Also check the settings or preferences for all the software on your computer and make sure none of it is set to start automatically with Windows.

### Install an SSD

One of the most effective ways to make Windows start up faster is to use a solid-state drive (SSD) instead of a mechanical hard drive. If you're planning to treat yourself to a new computer, make sure it comes with an SSD installed, because it makes a huge difference. An SSD enables a PC to start up in around a tenth of the time it takes with a hard drive.

**If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.**



## Use portable applications

Windows startup times get longer as your PC gets older. One of the main reasons is that PCs tend to become stuffed with software, which drains resources and slows Windows down.

The solution is to install as little software as possible and to use portable or web-based apps instead. For example, use LibreOffice portable ([bit.ly/libop488](http://bit.ly/libop488)) rather than installing it. Also use Microsoft Office web apps such as Word and Excel at [onedrive.live.com](http://onedrive.live.com) instead of installing Office, and GIMP portable ([bit.ly/gimp488](http://bit.ly/gimp488)) and Audacity portable ([bit.ly/aud488](http://bit.ly/aud488)) to edit photos and audio files.


Not all software developers make portable versions of their apps, and some can be hard to find, but there are hundreds of apps to explore at [portableapps.com/apps](http://portableapps.com/apps).

## Delay online storage tools

Cloud-storage services such as OneDrive, Google Drive and Dropbox are very useful but they start automatically with Windows and take a few minutes to sync. The first thing they do is scan your hard drive for files and compare them with the online versions. This taxes the processor, hard drive and memory, slowing Windows startup.

For a faster startup, stop your cloud services running automatically and run them manually when you need them. With OneDrive, for example, right-click the cloud icon in the notification area and select Settings. Click the Startup tab and remove the tick next to 'Start OneDrive automatically when I sign into Windows'. When you need it, click Start, type OneDrive and click to run it.

Google Drive and Dropbox are similar. Right-click the taskbar icon and go to settings or preferences, where you can choose to let them start with Windows or not. Disable this for maximum speed.


## TAKE IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

### Enable fast startup

You can enable fast startup in Windows 10 but this has its pros and cons. To activate it, open Control Panel, Power Options, 'Choose what the power buttons do', then click 'Change settings that are currently unavailable'. Tick the box 'Turn on fast startup (recommended)'. If you don't have this option, you can't change it.

When fast startup is enabled, the PC starts quickly, as you'd expect. This is because when it shuts down, it partially logs you out of your account and then hibernates. It starts up faster next time because many of the items Windows needs are loaded already.

If you like to tweak BIOS settings, boot from other devices or use other boot features, note that those options are difficult or impossible to access with fast startup enabled. What's more, you can no longer shut down your PC and switch it on again to fix any problems you're having. Click Start, Power, Restart instead.

### Clear the Start-up folder

If you use Windows 7 or earlier, you'll see a Start-up folder in the Start, All Programs menu. Windows 10 hides this, but if you enable 'Hidden items' on Explorer's View menu, it's in: C:\ProgramData\Microsoft\Windows\Start Menu\Programs\StartUp. Open it and check it for programs, because anything that appears there runs automatically when Windows starts. Nothing in it is essential, so you can click and drag any programs to the desktop and then run them manually if you ever need them.

Adding a shortcut to a program in this folder is an easy way to ensure that it starts with Windows. Find a program and copy it to the Start-up folder to run it automatically.

Alternatively, right-click a program and select 'Send to', then 'Desktop (create shortcut)' and drag the shortcut to the Startup folder.

### Disable Startup apps


Windows 10 stores startup programs in the Settings app. Open it and choose Apps, Start-up. In Windows 7, press Windows+R, enter msconfig and select the Startup tab.

Here you'll see a list of apps that start with Windows, as well as the impact they have on your PC's startup time. Nothing here is essential to Windows, so you can disable anything you don't need.

Another way to access the same list is to right-click the taskbar, select Task Manager and Click the Start-up tab. You can see each item's CPU usage and disk activity here, too. If you can't see these columns, right-click a column header and add them. The figures show which startup apps use most resources, and therefore which will deliver the biggest startup speed boost when disabled.

The best tool for tweaking Windows startup is Autoruns ([bit.ly/autor488](http://bit.ly/autor488)). Unzip it, right-click autoruns.exe and run it as an administrator. Right-click any 'file not found' items (in yellow) and delete them so that Windows doesn't waste time looking for them during startup. Red items are unknown but may be essential, so don't just delete them.

Check each entry for obvious signs that the item is unnecessary, perhaps because it belongs to software you've uninstalled or never use. If you're not sure what something is, leave it alone because you can break Windows if you delete the wrong things.



### Reduce the size of your backups

**Q** EaseUS Todo Backup tells me that my system backup will be 304GB. How can this be true when my C: drive is 304GB in total and has 190GB free? The Windows folder takes up just 22GB. Surely a system backup shouldn't copy the entire C: drive including empty space. What's going on here?

**A** There are different types of backup. File backups copy only your files, while clone-type backups make an exact copy of the hard drive and intelligent backups copy only the parts of the hard drive that are in use.

Todo Backup is telling you that the backup will be the same size as the disk, which implies that it's configured to clone the drive, creating an exact copy. This is useful if you need to

replace a hard drive, but a waste of space if all you need is a data backup.

To check which type of backup you're running, choose System Backup, then click Backup Options, Advanced and make sure 'Sector by sector backup' isn't ticked. In the Space section of the backup options, make sure normal or medium compression is selected.

## NETWORKING

### Get your network back

**Q** My household has a desktop PC, two iPads, two iPhones and, until recently, an HP laptop. However, a message now appears on the laptop telling me that the Ethernet connection doesn't have a valid IP configuration.

Everything has been working perfectly well for years, and both PCs are running genuine Windows 10 software. They have both succumbed to numerous updates since Windows 10 first appeared. Now, despite every effort, I can't connect the laptop to the internet.

I'm reluctant to reinstall Windows on the laptop because I'm not sure how up to date the backup is.

**A** A couple of things spring to mind, the first of which is to ask why you are using Ethernet instead of Wi-Fi. Although routers tend to come with one or more Ethernet ports, which means it's possible to connect a laptop using an Ethernet cable, most home networks use Wi-Fi. Perhaps Wi-Fi is disabled and Windows is trying to use Ethernet as an alternative, which is not set up.

Some laptops have a Wi-Fi on/off key,

such as F12. If yours has one, turn it on, then open Windows 10 Settings, click Network & Internet and select Wi-Fi on the left. It should be turned on and you should see a link to show available networks. Click it to make sure the computer is connected to your home Wi-Fi network.

The other possibility is that it's an IP address problem. Every PC, phone and tablet on your network must have a unique IP address, such

as 192.168.2.10. If a device doesn't have one, or two devices try to use the same address, problems can occur. This can happen if you set IP addresses manually, so it's better to use automatic settings.


### Set up Explorer associations

**Q** When I try to access my Windows 7 Downloads file, I receive the following message: "Explorer.EXE. This file does not have a program associated with it for performing this action. Please install a program or, if one is already installed, create an association in the Default Programs control panel". How do I perform these actions?

**A** We're not sure what's going on here. Do you mean you can't access the Downloads folder, or a particular file in the folder? It sounds as if you've downloaded a file that has an extension Windows doesn't recognise.

For example, if you downloaded a '.7z' file and double-clicked it in Explorer, an error message would appear saying that

no program is associated with it. The fix is to install a program that can open .7z files, such as 7-Zip ([www.7-zip.org](http://www.7-zip.org)). The program will tell Windows to associate that type of file with it when it installs.



**It's usually best to let your networking hardware work out its own IP address**

Open the Control Panel, then 'Network and Sharing Centre'. Here, you should see an active network with a Connections link on the right. Click it, then click the Properties button in the window that appears. In the next window, make sure Internet Protocol Version 4 is enabled. Double-click it and check that 'Obtain an IP address automatically' and 'Obtain DNS server address automatically' are both selected.

**Choose appropriate security**

**Q** I have always purchased security software and updated it regularly. Now some people claim that Windows Defender is all you need, while others say it's rubbish and that you should get a security suite - usually followed by the name of their favourite tool. Am I wasting my money with security software subscriptions?

**A** There isn't a simple yes or no answer to this. Some people find that Windows Defender is all they need, while others rely on free or purchased security software. Windows Defender was indeed a very poor option when Microsoft first introduced it, but it has steadily improved over the years and is now at a point where you can safely use it as your sole security option. It's very good at blocking malware.

That's not to say it's perfect, however, and third-party security suites offer much more than Windows Defender. For example, some security suites can keep an eye on what you or your family members type into web pages and block or warn you when any sensitive information is entered. It may also be possible to lock or erase the computer remotely if it's stolen. Other common

tools include app locks, credit card storage, secure shopping and search features, a VPN, password management, assorted utilities, security apps for your phone and so on.

The question you need to ask yourself is how much do you need these extras? Windows Defender simply protects your PC from viruses and spyware. It does that well, but threats can come from other directions, too. You may find that a paid-for security suite offers greater peace of mind if you'd rather just install the software and forget about it.

**Don't automatically update to Catalina**

**Q** A couple of years ago, I decided to invest in a beautiful 27in iMac. It looks great, but now every time Apple updates the operating system, something disappointing happens. The recent Catalina 64-bit fiasco has been the worst yet.

My genealogy software stopped working because it's 32-bit, and there's currently no 64-bit version. I bought some alternative software that gives me


**Disable laptop touchpad**

**Q** My laptop has a touchpad, but because I tend to work at a desk, I prefer to use a wireless mouse. However, I sometimes brush my hand against the touchpad while typing, which moves the mouse pointer so I end up typing or clicking in the wrong place. How do I disable the touchpad?

**A** Is there any software installed on your laptop that lets you configure the touchpad or change its settings? If not, open Control Panel and click Mouse. The Mouse Properties window may include a touchpad tab, where you can configure its settings. Check this for a Disable option.

If you can't see any such option in the Control Panel, open the Windows

10 Settings app and click Devices. Select Touchpad and set the sensitivity to the lowest setting. It should now ignore accidental touches.





access to my 30 years of research, but I'll need to check the 7,500-plus individuals manually after the transition. There's no 64-bit software for my scanner, either, and it's not even that old.


The biggest disappointment, however, is that Picasa doesn't work at all any more. I know that Google no longer supports it, but I've never found any software I like as much to replace it.

I have more than 50,000 photos, many of which I have scanned over the years, so they don't include any metadata. Some of them are from the 19th Century. I have saved these using filenames that include a date and the image number (for example, 20191013 - 001.jpg, which is the year, month, day and count number). They are all stored in a date-named folder structure on my hard drive.

Now I need to recover the face and geo tagging and the comments, and to sort the images by folder. Do you have any suggestions?

**A** Unlike previous versions of macOS, Catalina will not run 32-bit applications. There's no way of getting around this, so you have no choice but to use 64-bit software. It's too late now, but remember for next time that operating system upgrades are not compulsory, and you can keep using your current OS for as long as you like. Mojave was clearly your best option.

Upgrading is always risky, so making a backup first is essential. SuperDuper ([www.shirt-pocket.com](http://www.shirt-pocket.com)) clones the Mac's internal drive to a USB drive that you can then use to boot it up (hold down Option after switching on). This lets you run your Mac as it was before you installed Catalina, so you can use apps that don't work with the update or restore your Mac and undo the upgrade.

Assuming you don't have a backup and can't restore Mojave, try Family Tree Maker ([www.mackiev.com/ftm](http://www.mackiev.com/ftm)), Mac Family Tree 9 (from the Mac App Store) or Heredis 2019 World (also in the

Mac App Store). All three are 64-bit programs that work in Catalina.

Have you imported your photos into Apple Photos? This supports face detection and geotagging, and you can even search the contents of photos. Type 'dog' into the search box, for example, and it shows all photos containing dogs. Google Photos is even better, and recognises people, places and objects in photos. Storage is free and unlimited for photos of up to 16 megapixels. Install Google Backup and Sync ([bit.ly/gbs488](http://bit.ly/gbs488)) on your Mac to upload your photos automatically.

## NETWORKING

### Stop DNS settings changing

**Q** I use Windows 10 and Linux Mint on separate laptops, and have set up Cloudflare (1.1.1.1 and 1.0.0.1) as the DNS server on both. My Firefox and internet connection settings are identical on both computers.

When I occasionally run DNS Leak Test ([dnsleaktest.com](http://dnsleaktest.com)) on the Kaspersky-protected Windows laptop, nothing untoward crops up. However, after a few minutes online with the Linux Mint device, the DNS server changes from Cloudflare to Google.

I've checked the location of the Google IP address, and the server (74.125.47.12, six in total) appears to be operated by Google Translate, which is located in Brussels. I have never used this service, but that aside I can't understand how Google can



presume it has the right to override my DNS settings.

**A** It's very unlikely that Google is overriding your network settings, unless you have installed a program that specifically does that. The IP address you mention does indeed belong to Google. Some reports we found said it

wasn't a regular computer and one said it was Google Translate. It's very odd if [dnsleaktest.com](http://dnsleaktest.com) is reporting that you're using Google

Translate as your DNS server.

We found some other Linux users who were experiencing unusual DNS behaviour, and they fixed the problem by opening `/etc/NetworkManager/NetworkManager.conf` and changing the line `dns=dnsmasq` to `#dns=dnsmasq`. This fix may work for you, too.

### Get up-to-date scanner software

**Q** I wonder if you and your team can offer advice on free or low-cost scanner software. I own an Epson Perfection 2480 Photo, but the manufacturer isn't providing a driver for Windows 10 64-bit, rendering the scanner useless. I have tried a couple of alternative drivers without success, including one that leaves a watermark that only disappears if you pay. My scanner only gets occasional use, so I can't justify buying a new one and the carbon footprint that involves.

**A** Sorry you're having trouble with Epson's lack of support. For free scanner software, we'd recommend trying NAPS2 ([www.naps2.com](http://www.naps2.com)), which is free and open-source, so you shouldn't have to deal with any sneaky watermarks.

There are some other things you could try to make sure your scanner is running properly - it's always worth checking drivers for older operating systems, such as

the Windows 7 drivers, and some people have had success using drivers for similar scanner models. However, there's no guarantee that this will work.

You could also try scanning in Linux, since Epson still has a driver for your scanner for that operating system.



identified by ID code. To find out which extension is which, go to `chrome://extensions`, select a browser tool, then note the ID code in the address bar. Now, you can copy the latest version of the extension over to your new computer. Next, go to `chrome://extensions`, turn on 'Developer mode', and choose 'Load unpacked' to get the extension running.



## Launch programs faster





## Get more taskbar space





For well over a year, I have struggled to find a solution to why a 2016 HP desktop PC that I look after for an elderly relative would repeatedly fail to install Windows 10 version 1803 (the April 2018 Update). I had tried everything that was suggested by Roland with no success.

Since the PC was working fine and my relative would have been lost without it, I decided to leave well alone and concluded that I could always reinstall Windows 10 at some time in the future if necessary.

Then, in September this year, my



relative contacted me for urgent help. When I looked at the PC, I found to my total surprise that version 1803 had, for some reason, successfully installed and that the reported problem was caused by

the insistent privacy questions required for this update to finally complete. One month later, I have discovered that Windows version 1903 (May 2019 Update) has now installed as well, so everything is finally up to date.

This all goes to show that Windows 10 is able to correct its own

update errors. However, I am still perplexed by the situation and have not encountered more than a fleeting problem with any other setup.

## Let's stamp out snail mail in 2020

**H**ere we are on the cusp of 2020 – a date that still sounds ridiculously futuristic to me – and yet we're still clinging to a mode of communication that was invented when the Pharaohs were knocking around Egypt.

Email should have killed off the postal service years ago. It's certainly given it a good kicking, to be fair, but I'm still dealing with businesses that insist on communicating via 'snail mail' for no good reason whatsoever.

I've spent the past week getting quotes for a new boiler. The first company was referred to me by the very forward-thinking energy supplier Octopus ([octopus.energy](http://octopus.energy)), which literally changes my energy prices every half an hour in line with demand, takes all my readings via smart meters and hasn't sent me a single piece of paper in the year I've been with them. I love my accountants. They finally convinced me to stop running my business on patchy Excel spreadsheets
